Growers Charge Firms With Violation

(Continued From Page 1) ing additional acreage and placing the acreage under cultivation for the purpose of putting the independent potato growers out of business or enabling them to purchase growers' land and potatoes at depressed prices.

As a result of the alleged anti-trust violations, it is claimed that the plaintiffs sustained losses in the value of their businesses and in the profits which they would have made and that they were required to pay more for potato seed and fertilizers purchased from the defendants than they would have paid otherwise.

The potato growers and the growers' associations bringing the action have asked for money damages of an undetermined amount. If the defendant potato processors are found to have violated the anti-trust laws, as alleged, it would be possible for the unnamed potato growers, on whose behalf the suit is also being brought, to come into court at a later time and recover the amount of damages they suffered as a result of the violations.

In addition, the plaintiffs have requested the court to enjoin the defendants from continuing their unlawful conduct and to enter an order requiring Ore-Ida Foods, Inc., and J. R. Simplot to divest themselves of all potato growing lands which they own or operate in competition with individual growers.

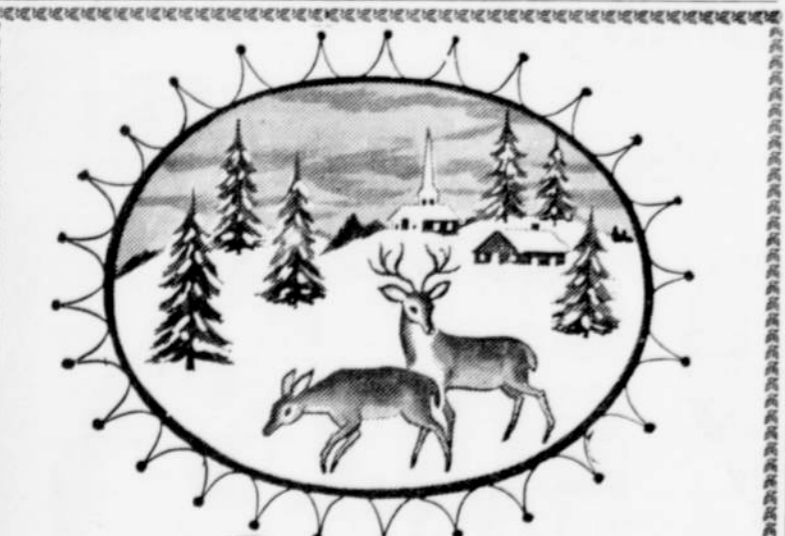
