The Nyssa Bulldogs won their first hoop tilt of the season Tuesday evening with a 61-44 victory over the Grant Union lads at John Day. The local boys had been defeated by this same team during their first contest of the season.

Brad Maxfield was top scorer for the Bulldogs with 20 points, followed by Gary Ross with 14; Danny Wilson and Dick Finger, 8 each; Tom Moore, 5; Dennis Schilling, 4; Scott Jefferies, 2.
