Walter Herrman Dies During Holiday Visit With Kennedy Family

Funeral rites for Walter Herrmann, father of Nyssa Mrs. Robert Kennedy, were conducted Tuesday morning, Jan. 3, 1967, at Milton-Freewater. Officiating was Father William Roden, the deceased's brother-in-law and former pastor of St. Patrick's Catholic church in Vale.

The Herrmanns were spending the holidays with the Kennedys in Nyssa where on Dec. 28 Mr. Herrmann suffered a sudden stroke. He succumbed two days later in Malheur Memorial hospital.

He was born Dec. 16, 1894, married Elizabeth Roden on Nov. 3, 1927, and was a fruit farmer in the Milton-Freewater area.

In addition to his widow of the home and his daughter of Nyssa, he is survived by four sons, Philip of Moses Lake, Wash., Michael of Baker, Richard and Peter Hermann of Walla Walla, Wash.; another daughter, Mrs. Jim Helling of Pendleton.

Also surviving are two sisters, Mrs. Joe Hoffman of Oregon City and Sister Agatha of Olympia, Wash.

THE LIMITS OF CANADIAN HONKERS, held by local contractor Cliff Main (left) and son Kent were killed Monday near Rome, Ore. Father and son (age 19) have been hunting together eight or nine years and this is the first time they have gotten the legal limit of these big birds. Kent says they left Nyssa about 4:30 that morning and cased the areas with field glasses until the huge birds were located. He related they crawled about one-fourth mile on the first bunch of 50 to 75 geese, only to have them scared by a plane breaking the sound barrier. They then crawled another 100 yards or so and killed two. The second bunch furnished the other four—all before 2 p.m. the same day. They returned to the same area yesterday (Wednesday) and came home "skunked," showing it's "not easy."—Journal Photo.

8—Malheur county declared a disaster area by U. S. Department of Agriculture. This is seen as affording some relief to drought-stricken cattlemen and farmers in non-irrigated areas.

8—Nyssa Police Chief Francis Petrie resigns effective Sept. 15 after 5½ years of duty. He was temporarily replaced by Sgt. Alvin Allen, second in command on the force, with all other members being promoted.

15—Number of farms in county listed at 1,737 in 1964, showing a 13 percent decline since 1959.

15—Nyssa Chamber of Commerce votes to sponsor Thunderegg Days again in 1967—setting the first week in August as date for the event.

22—Seventh annual Crazy Days event set for the weekend. This is Nyssa's biggest single promotion in the year for merchants.

29—Heart attack claims Kenneth S. Renstrom, prominent Nyssa businessman, active in civic affairs for many years.

29—Ten churches of county organize council at Nyssa meeting Sept. 11.

OCTOBER

6—Paul House, manager of North Board of Control for 17 years, announces his resignation for a similar position in Washington state.

6—Thomas G. Jones, UP freight agent at Nyssa and prominent civic leader and ex-mayor, dies of heart attack.

6—Malheur Memorial hospital applies for federal funds to aid in construction of nursing home.

6—Lloyd Mackrill, manager of M & W market in Nyssa for 13 years, resigns and is replaced by George Patterson, manager of the Vale M & W store.

27—Werner H. Peutz, local farmer and lifetime resident, succumbs from heart attack.

NOVEMBER

3—Total taxes to be levied in Malheur county reach past \$4 million level with schools getting 71.6 percent of the total for an average of \$117 for every individual in the county.

10—Flames destroy one-half block of buildings on South First street that in early days was the center of the business district.

17—Sam Hartley, farmer in the Adrian district, named area conservationist through farm practices saving soil and water.

17—A community drive for funds to bring sick woman's parents from Costa Rica gets under way.

24—Malheur Memorial hospital gets approval of state board of health for \$129,000 grant for new addition to house nursing beds.

DECEMBER

1—Roy Hirai of Nyssa elected president of National Potato council at Arizona meeting.

8—Sudden illness claims life of prominent community leader, Warren Farmer. His passing, less than one year from the date of the sudden death of his wife, Wilda.

8—Successful fund drive of recent weeks enables parents and small nephew of Nyssa woman to fly from Costa Rica to be with her during her illness.

15—Huge crowd in Nyssa for Christmas parade. Santa makes first appearance, is interviewed by small tots.

22—Area churches plan Yule observance with special services and programs.

29—Hospital board members give thinking on plans for nursing wing addition, seen as self-financing though backed by bonds if approved in January election.

29—Local Bank Manager Ron Young announces his resignation to take a similar position at The Dalles in January.
