were available on a \$3 basis to \$1 from the county a plan might be set up to replace one bridge per year, with the county's portion to be taken off the "top" of the gas tax refund.

Formula Considered

Lloyd Castner, representing Ontario, said possibly he should not enter into the discussion of a distribution of the gas tax refund (since it is set by laws that the incorporations get) but he wondered if a plan based on mileage and assessed valuation might be used. He said he did not have a formula to suggest but thought it might be worth considering.

Judge White and former County Judge G. Y. "Red" Chester made it clear that the law made no provision for the distribution of the refund money within the county—that it was strictly up to the court—and that the past formula based strictly on assessed valuation would not solve the problems.

The next meeting is set for 1:30 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 2, and again offers interesting discussion.

Mrs. Young Sends Newspaper Report Of Plane Mishap

Larry Ferrel, 25-year-old son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Young of Nyssa, was one of three members of the Arvada-based Sundown Ranch Boys, a country-music group, who were killed Dec. 30 in a plane crash about three miles northeast of Hutchinson, Kan.

An unofficial report in last week's Journal listed the young man, husband of the former Joann Young, as Larry Serrel which was incorrect.

Others killed in the crash were identified as Troy Ellis of Granby, manager of the group; and Harold Main, the firm's pilot, of Lake-wood. Ferrel handled transportation.

According to a newspaper clipping sent to the Journal by Mrs. Ralph Young, who is with her daughter in Arvada, the plane was a four-seat, single-engine Mooney Super 21.

The group had made a refueling stop about 7 p.m. at Hutchinson and then took off for Granby where they had an evening engagement.

A Federal Aviation agency official at the Hutchinson airport said he lost contact with the plane shortly after takeoff.

A farmer, after hearing a radio broadcast about the missing plane, found it in his field. It had plunged into an embankment in approximately seven inches of snow.

Airport officials said there was a 300-foot ceiling and visibility of five miles at time of the crash and the temperature was about 30 degrees. The Civil Aeronautics board sent a team of investigators in an attempt to determine cause of the crash.

THE SIGNATURE THAT BINDS

Jimmy and his wife decided to sell their house and move to Florida. They contacted a real estate agent and put their house up for sale, then left for the beach.

Jimmy told the agent he wanted \$18,000 for the house. A month later Jimmy received a printed real estate contract filled in by the agent and signed by a prospective buyer. The price stated in this contract was \$12,000.

Jimmy phoned the agent and told him they would not sell for \$12,000 but that they would sign the contract and mail it back, and when the agent received it he could negotiate further with the prospective buyers and get them to offer at least \$16,000.

If the agent got \$16,000, he could amend the contract by striking out \$12,000 and putting \$16,000 in the blank. If he could not get \$16,000, he should tear up the signed contract. The agent said he would do just that.

The agent, however, did not follow these instructions. He delivered the signed contract to the buyers, and Jimmy and his wife were compelled to sell their house for \$12,000.

Jimmy made a serious mistake in signing a contract with provisions he did not like, relying on someone else to amend it after it was signed. There is a rule of law that, in general, a person cannot sign a paper and then later claim that what he signed was not the agreement between him and the other party.

An equally important warning is: Don't sign a contract or document in reliance on someone's assurance that you will not be bound by what you have signed. Sales agreements often contain

a paragraph saying that this signed agreement represents the entire contract and that salesmen are not authorized to make any contrary agreements. Nevertheless, some salesmen—too anxious to earn their commissions or too unscrupulous to worry—do assure customers that the contract will be changed, or even ignored, after they have signed it.

Putting the matter in simple language, be hard-nosed when you are asked to sign your name. Believe what the paper says, not what anyone tells you. After you have signed, it will be the paper that counts, not the words of the salesman.
