

Sudden Attack Claims R. E. Moss; Rites Held Monday at Local Chapel

Funeral services for Rommel Edward Moss were conducted Monday afternoon, Jan. 16, 1967, at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating was Elder Leslie Henry of Pocatello, with vocal selections by Edward Bradshaw.

Mr. Moss succumbed the previous Friday at Malheur Memorial hospital after suffering a sudden heart attack.

He was born Oct. 22, 1906, at Ottumwa, Iowa, a son of J. C. and Iva Bybee Moss, and attended schools in western Nebraska. On Feb. 24, 1926, he was married to Marguerite McDonald in Banner county, Neb. The family came to Treasure Valley in 1936. Mr. Moss worked as a carpenter, more recently was engaged in farming and at time of his death was a janitor for the Nyssa schools.

The deceased was a member of Primitive Baptist church, Owyhee Riding club and Oregon Trail Grange.

In addition to his widow of the home, he is survived by four daughters, Mrs. Roma Uria and Mrs. Anita Hill of Homedale, Mrs. Jeanene Stradley and Mrs. Regina Jamieson of Bend; one son, Gary Moss of the home.

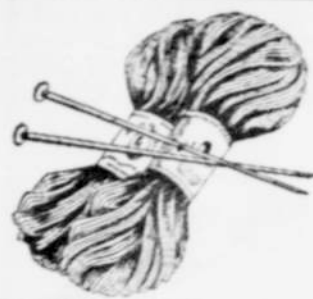
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
