Mrs. Schraufnagel Succumbs; Rites Held in Lewiston

Requiem Mass for Jeine Murillo Schraufnagel was held Friday evening, Jan. 20, 1967, at St. Bridget's Catholic church with Father Cletus M. Kirkpatrick officiating.

She succumbed Wednesday night, Jan. 18, at Malheur Memorial hospital, following an extended illness of a cancerous nature.

Journal readers will recall a family picture and story in the Dec. 8, 1966 issue, shortly after Jeine's parents, Evencio and Amada Murillo and three-year-old Luisito arrived from Costa Rica.

Their plane trip to Nyssa was made possible by financial help from friends of the area, working with United States and Costa Rican government officials.

The family remained with the Schraufnagel couple until time of Jeine's death.

Mrs. Schraufnagel was born Jan. 27, 1941 in Sarchi, Costa Rica, and came to the United States five years ago. On May 21, 1966, she was married in Lewiston, Idaho, to Dale Schraufnagel, a Nyssa high school typing and journalism instructor.

The deceased was educated in her native country and prior to her marriage was employed at St. Joseph's hospital in Lewiston.

In addition to her parents and husband, she is survived by a brother, Carlos Luis Murillo of Costa Rica.

Recitation of the Rosary was Sunday evening at the Catholic church in Lewiston, with Requiem Mass held Monday and interment made in the cemetery there.
