Bulldogs Capture First Wrestling Bouts of Season

Ralph Estrada, Darryl King, Dan Marostica and Darr Jensen won their matches by pins. Winning by decision were Chip Burningham, Richard Parra, Jim Ableman and Fred Eplin.

The Pirates took three bouts by decision and won the upper weight division by a forfeit.

In the Tuesday evening match with the visiting Caldwell Cougars, Rudy Vendrell, Jensen, Ableman and Eplin took their bouts by pins. Winning by decisions were Burningham, Parra and Estrada.

The Cougars picked up points by one pin, three decisions and Nyssa forfeiting the heavyweight division. The loss left Caldwell with a 6-4 overall mark.

Reservations should be made prior to Feb. 10 at the office of the Nyssa plant or through any of the foremen.



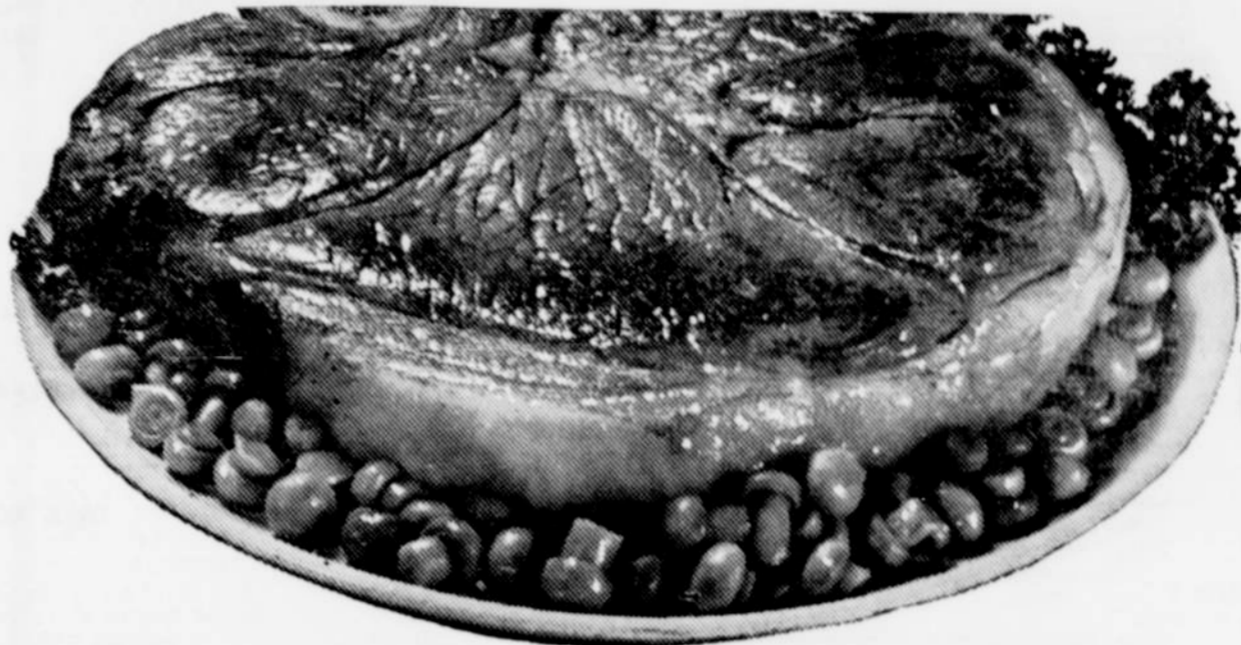

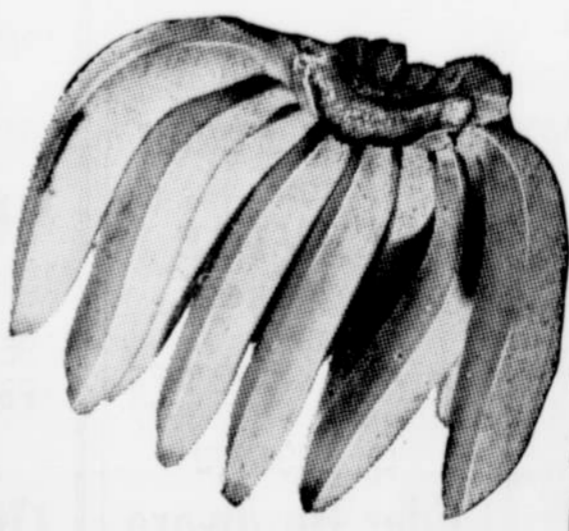
