### Work Smarter . . . Not Harder

#### WHAT CAUSES A NON-STICK PAN TO STICK?

If the pan is frequently overheated, a little fat from food bakes into the finish. Eventually enough builds up to impair its non-stick qualities.

You can use a plastic mesh pad to clean a non-stick finish, but don't use steel wool or metal scouring pads.

The following method should remove discoloration unless the finish is severely darkened. Mix two tablespoons of baking soda with a half cup of liquid chlorine bleach and a cup of water. Boil this mixture in the stained pan for about 10 minutes. Then wash and rinse. Wipe the pan with salad oil before using.

#### HAVE TROUBLE HANGING PICTURES

... on rough plaster or wall-board? Adhesive tape picture hangers don't stick on this type of wall.

Mrs. Dorothy Brown, OSU extension home furnishings specialist, says one easy method is to use a needle instead of a nail. Break off the eye of the needle with pliers. Then hammer the needle into the wall at a downward angle.

There'll be only a tiny hole in the wall and the angling needle is strong enough to hold a picture. For large heavy pictures, use large needles.

#### WHAT'S YOUR TIME WORTH?

#### TAKE-IT-WITH-YOU WALL PAPER

... is the latest thing, says Mrs. Dorothy Brown, extension home furnishings specialist at Oregon State university.

A new method makes it possible to remove whole strips without using tools or wetting. You can use this technique on all wall coverings, such as paper, flocks, metallics and grass cloth.

First, you coat the wall with a release coating, then hang the wall cover with a special paste. When the covering is peeled off, the release stays on the wall for future redecorating. And the paste stays on the wall covering so that you can rehang it.
