

Methodist Pastor Of Boise To Conduct Local Services

Special services will be held at Nyssa Methodist Church on Sunday, March 19 through March 23. The Annual Christian Life Mission, to which the public is invited, will feature guest speaker, the Rev. Wendell L. Coe of Boise.

He will preach during the 11 a.m. worship service on Palm Sunday and at 7:30 each evening Sunday through Thursday.

The Rev. Coe is superintendent of the eastern district of the Idaho Methodist Conference, having charge of churches in southern Idaho, east of Boise. He is a native of New York State, where he attended Syracuse university. He was graduated from Baker university in Kansas and did his graduate theological studies at Boston University School of Theology and Harvard.

The Rev. Coe served churches in Portland and North Bend before going to Idaho in 1961, holding pastorates at Blackfoot, Rupert and Boise. He assumed his present post in 1965.

He has led a number of church building programs, has been active in civic affairs and is chaplain for the Idaho wing of the Civil Air patrol.

The guest speaker will talk Sunday morning on "Parade With A Passion". His evening topics will include "Roots for a New World", "The Political Platform of Jesus", "God Is Alive!", "The Conversion of A Believer", "The Major Role of A Minor Character".

In addition, the series will include a fellowship potluck dinner at 1 p.m. Sunday and a sing-along session using the new hymnals.

An "Inquirer's Hour" will be held at the close of each evening service, with the Revs. Coe and Ralph A. Lawrence available for counsel and discussion.

Pertinent Facts About Medicare

Many elderly citizens of Malheur County could benefit from one of the hidden features of the Medicare law reports Al Rainsberry, local Field Representative of the Social Security Administration. Medicare will pay for home visits by nurses, physical therapists, and certain other health workers employed by a home health agency that is participating in the program.

Payment can be made for part-time nursing care, physical therapy, some medical supplies, use of special equipment, etc. Rainsberry emphasized that neither full-time nursing care nor general house-keeping services are covered under this provision.

HOME VISITS

The hospital insurance part of the law and the voluntary supplementary section each provides for up to 100 visits per year by home health workers. Under the hospital provision, the beneficiary must have been hospitalized for at least three days before payment for home visits can begin. Under the supplementary medical insurance plan, he does not have to be hospitalized for at least three days before payment for home visits can begin. Under the supplementary medical insurance plan, he does not have to be hospitalized first to get the services. The requirement under this plan is that there is a medical need for the service. In either case, his doctor decides whether he needs the services and sets up the plan.

MALHEUR "FORTUNATE" Providing skilled services in the home is one of the newest developments in medical care. According to Rainsberry, many communities have limited or no facilities for furnishing these services but the prospects of Medicare revenues should speed their development. "Malheur County is fortunate," he said, "that the Malheur County Health Department is equipped to provide some of these services to the home bound residents."

Monday Chapel Services Held For T. A. Gall

Funeral rites for Tobias A. Gall were conducted at 2 o'clock Monday, March 13, 1967 at Leinkaemper chapel. Officiating was the Rev. Ralph A. Lawrence of Nyssa Methodist church.

Mr. Gall, a 20-year resident of the Nyssa area, succumbed Friday at Malheur Memorial hospital. Members of the family report that he died of heart failure after undergoing surgery for an intestinal obstruction.

The deceased was born July 29, 1882 in Highland county, Ohio, a son of William A. and Hepsie Shepley Gall. He was married Feb. 2, 1905 to Isa B. Reddick at Sinking Spring, Ohio.

Mr. Gall worked for the National Cash Register company until 1913 when he moved to North Dakota where he remained until 1938. The Galls then moved to Montana, ranching near Sidney and Creston until 1944.

For the next three years, with exception of a year at Notus, Idaho, the Galls divided their time between Ohio and California.

In 1947 the deceased came to Nyssa and operated a furniture business until retiring ten years ago.

He was a member of the Dunkard church in Elmville, Ohio, and according to relatives and acquaintances had many friends and was a friend to many.

A short time ago he gave three cigars to his friend, Harvey Howard. They were the ones Harvey had given him when each of his children were born, the first one approximately 15 years ago.

Mr. Gall is survived by one son, Lionel Gall of Sidney, Mont.; two daughters, Mrs. Hamilton (Helen) Chadder of Mountain Home, Idaho and Mrs. Jerry (Bonnie) Bright of Joseph, Ore.

Also surviving are three brothers, one sister and seven grandchildren. In addition to his wife, who succumbed in 1961, he was preceded in death by one son, Kenneth A. Gall. Interment was made in the Nyssa cemetery, under direction of Lienkaemper chapel. Active pallbearers were Harry Miner, Ralph Lawrence, John Dority, William Lemmon and Fred Bennett. Honorary bearers included Harvey Howard, Charles Steffens, Rolf Usenko, Robert and Red Wilson.
