of the rolling country such as Black Canyon and Big Bend, lanterns were posted on high places to guide you.

My horses learned the purpose of this and would head toward the lighted cabin. One night I came near to having a bad accident while driving on the sand dunes on the Owyhee. The horses left the road and took off toward the rising moon and the next thing I knew we were tumbling in the sand. The horses broke away and left me.

On another occasion they headed off toward the rising moon, and the river was between us and the moon. My horses were excellent swimmers but I did not relish the thought of a moonlight ride in the river.

I was told on every occasion to stop and let them see the moon come up and the light diffuse then they would learn to stay on the road. This worked fine and a few lumps of sugar showed them I appreciated their attention.

All country doctors have had their experiences. I knew one doctor who lost his life in the Snake River near Homedale while trying to get to a patient. Dr. Pogue, the old doctor whom I met when I first came here, almost lost his life in the river but was able to hold on to some willows until help arrived. He did, however, lose his who outfit.

Association officers urge all interested lady keglers to attend.

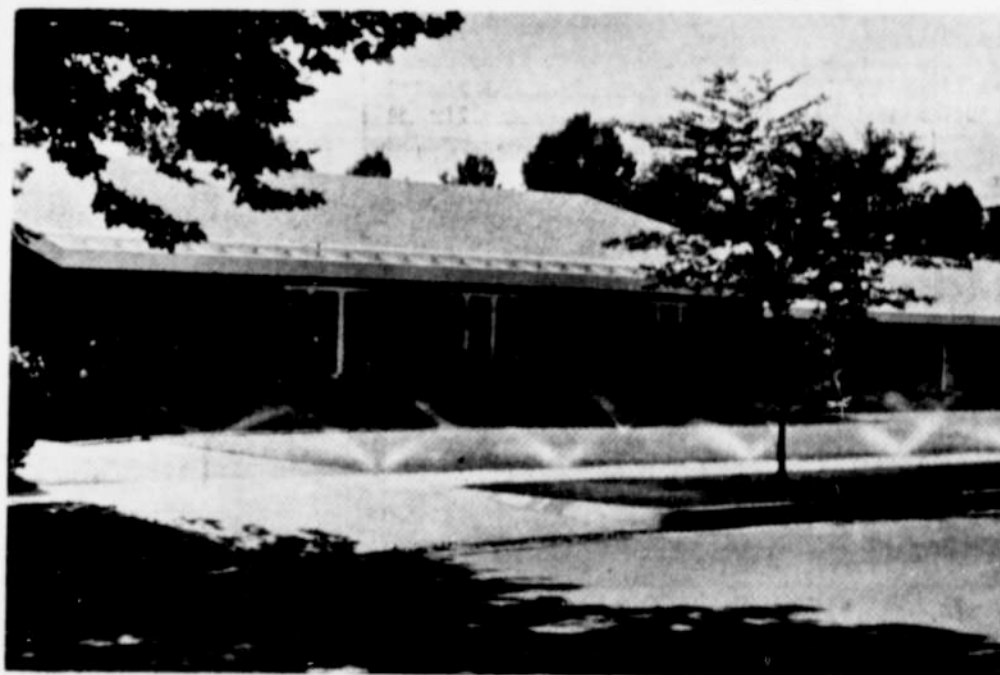
APRIL 4 DATE SET FOR CBPW MEETING
