... Former Nyssans, Wed 60 Years

Celebrating their diamond anniversary recently were Mr. and Mrs. S. F. Foster of Milton-Freewater who have seen the transition of the drug store in Oregon from the days when the pharmacist measured and stirred the medicine, to the modern super drug stores.

The anniversary observance, held on Easter Sunday, 1967, was a quiet one with only members of their immediate family present.

Among those attending the dinner were their two sons-in-law and daughters, Mr. and Mrs. Cecil (Donna) Chally of Colfax, Wash., Mr. and Mrs. James B. (Fay) Schick of Walla Walla, and members of their families.

Grandchildren present included Mr. and Mrs. Glen Dodd of Yakima, Joy Schick, a Whitman college student and Stephen Schick, a student at the University of Idaho. Also present was a great-granddaughter, Dawn Marie Dodd of Yakima. A grandson, Paul Chally of Syracuse, N.Y. was unable to attend.

Mr. Foster was born in the Goldendale country, was graduated 1904 from Washington Agricultural college and school of Science, now WSU.

He was married to Myrtle L. White on March 30, 1907 in Baker, where he worked in drug stores for two years.

He purchased a drug store in Nyssa in 1906 and operated it for 15 years. (Journal readers will remember an old-time

picture of the structure, together with a photo of the building after it was gutted by fire early in November last year. The structure was located on South First street, across the street north from the former Nyssa furniture company store.)

After leaving Nyssa, Mr. Foster owned and operated drug stores in Elgin, Bend, La Grande, Halsey, Weston and Stanfield, Ore.; and in Dayton, Wash.

After 60 years as a practicing pharmacist, in 1964 he asked the Oregon State Board of Pharmacy for a certificate of retirement.

Her fingertip-veil was secured to a star-shaped fabric flower, graced with sequins and pearls. She carried a bouquet fashioned from Easter lilies.

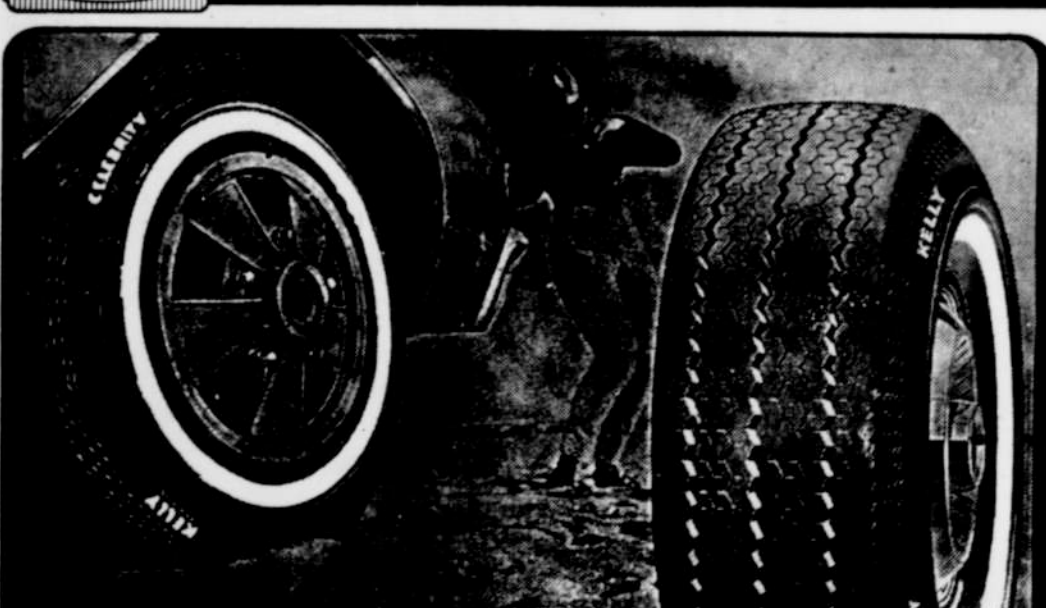
Martha Loera, dressed in a turquoise shift frock, attended her sister as maid of honor. Lawrence L. Sights of Ontario served as best man.
