

Student Body Elections Set For April 12, at Nyssa High

Student Body Elections are on the school agenda for the next few weeks and students of Nyssa High should start thinking about Student Council Positions up for election.

Monday, March 27, at their regular meeting, the Student Council will make their nominations for council posts. The following Wednesday, March 29, a student body assembly will be held homeroom period for final nominations from students.

Wednesday, April 5, Primary elections will be held to narrow the nominees to two for each office. An assembly for campaign speeches and final remarks by the candidates is slated for Wednesday morning, April 12, with the final elections at noon in the canteen.

Section 3, Article 3, of the school constitution states: "The president of the Student Body shall be selected from the Junior Class; the Vice President from the Sophomore Class; the Secretary from the Junior, Sophomore, or Freshman Classes; the Treasurer from the Sophomore or Junior Classes; and Inter-Class Rivalry Chairman shall be selected from the Junior Class and a Public Relations Officer shall be selected from the Junior or Senior Classes."

Varsity yell leaders will also be elected in the general election. All girls interested should watch the bulletin for the announcement of the time and place they may sign up.

In the NHS constitution it states that all candidates for a student council position must have at least a two point grade average up to and including the preceding semester.

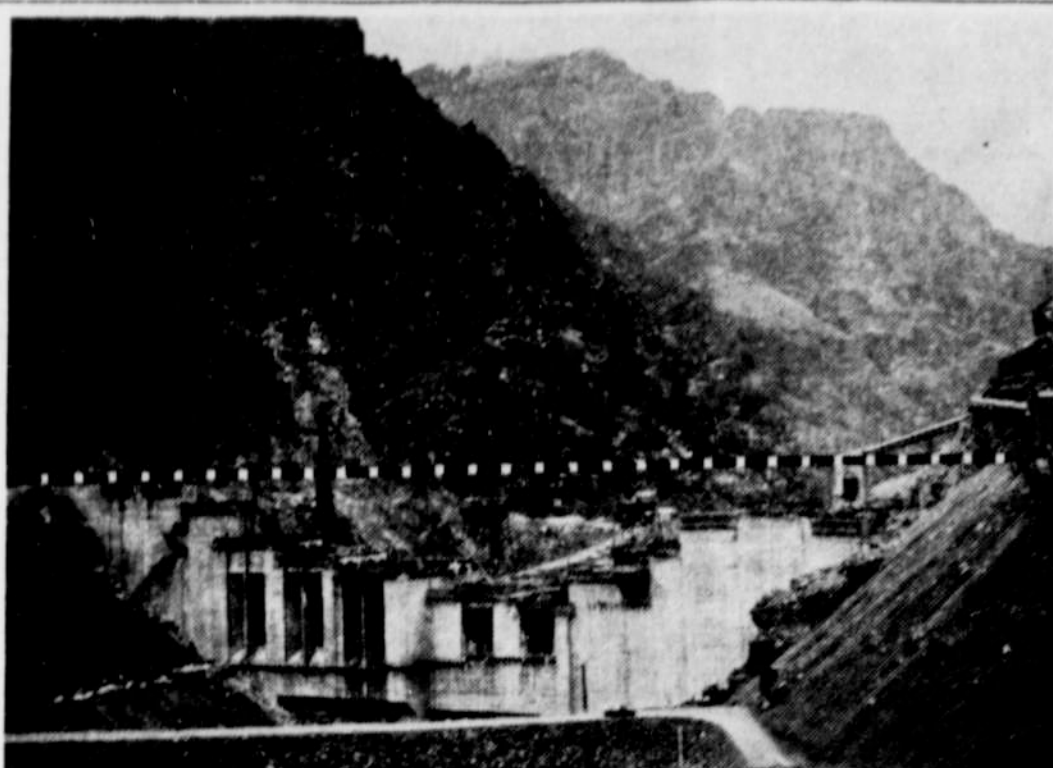
ADVICE TO THE NIGHT OWL

USDA Schedules Parma Hearing

A public hearing to consider proposed amendments to the federal marketing order for onions grown in Idaho and Malheur County, Ore., was announced by the United States Department of Agriculture.

The hearing will begin at 9:30 a.m., Wednesday, April 19, at Community Hall, in Parma, Idaho.

USDA's Consumer and Marketing Service said the amendments were proposed by the Idaho - Eastern Oregon Onion Committee, the industry group which administers the marketing order.

Proposed amendments would: (1) authorize paid advertising and promotion of onions, (2) permit the committee to establish a reserve fund to cover up to one year's operating expenses of the order, and (3) add marking, for product identification, to the authority now included in the marketing order for regulating containers.

C&MS officials said the hearing notice and proposals are being mailed to all known onion growers and handlers in the producing area. Copies may also be obtained from Robert H. Eaton, Field Representative, Fruit and Vegetable Division, Consumer and Marketing Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, 1218 S.W. Washington St., Portland, Ore. 97205.
