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It passed almost unnoticed in the news, but Mr. Justice William O. Douglas on March 20 delivered himself of one of the most remarkable muddled-headed dissenting opinions of his long and muddled career.

He called for judicial answers to a string of questions having to do with the war in Vietnam; and though he piously avowed that for his own part, he was "intimating no opinion on the merits," the very asking of the questions made it clear that in Mr. Justice Douglas, the peace-niks have picked up a dove who occupies a very lofty perch.

The Douglas opinion was buried in a long list of routine orders denying appeals in a number of pending cases. This was an appeal sought by a petitioner named Mitchell, who had been sentenced to five years for refusing to report for military induction. Eight members of the Supreme Court voted, in effect, to affirm the conviction without even hearing argument; in the legal term, they denied certiorari. Only Douglas dissented.

Mitchell's defense was that the "war" in Vietnam is being conducted in violation of various treaties to which the U.S. is a signatory party, especially the Treaty of London of 1945. This declares that "waging a war of aggression" is a "crime against peace" imposing "individual responsibility." Article 8 of the treaty provides that even though a soldier may act pursuant to an order of his government or of a superior officer, that fact "shall not free him of responsibility" for his crime in waging aggressive war.

Mitchell argued that because the war in Vietnam is an aggressive war, it is in violation of the Treaty of London; and, therefore, he could not participate in such a war, even upon orders of his government, without exposing himself to trial and punishment as a war criminal. Douglas was plainly ready to buy this.

Douglas recalled that at the time of Nuremberg trials, the late Mr. Justice Jackson had said that "if certain acts in violation of treaties are crimes, they are crimes whether the United States does them or whether Germany does them." Douglas also noted that under the Constitution treaties are part of the supreme law of the land. Then he took off into space:

This case presents the questions:

(1) whether the Treaty of London is a treaty within the meaning of Art. VI, clause 2;
(2) whether the question as to the waging of an aggressive "war" is in the context of this criminal prosecution a justiciable question;

(3) whether the Vietnam episode is a "war" in the sense of the treaty;

(4) whether petitioner has standing to raise the question;
(5) whether, if he has, it may be tendered as a defense in the criminal case or in amelioration of the punishment.

These are extremely sensitive and delicate questions. But they should, I think, be answered. Even those who think that the Nuremberg judgments were unconstitutional by our guar-

Ontario Wins Track Meet

Ontario set five new marks Friday in their own Blue Ribbon Relay track meet.

The Ontario squad finished in first place with 33 points, while Baker had 32 1/2, Weiser 20, Burns 17, Nyssa 15 and Vale 14 1/2.

New records were made in the long jump, high jump, 440 relays, sprint medley and 480 shuttle hurdles. Baker, Burns, Nyssa, Ontario and Weiser each set a record.

The Baker hurdlers cleared the hurdles at a 55-second pace to clip 2.5 seconds off the old record, which the Bulldogs had set two years ago. Four Ontario lads set a new mark of 45.5 in the 440 relay, taking over the Weiser record set last spring of 46.2.

Weiser took the record time in the sprint medley with a time of 2:02.6, and set an unofficial half-mile time of 2:01.0 in the two-mile relay to boost the team to a win in the inauguration of the event.

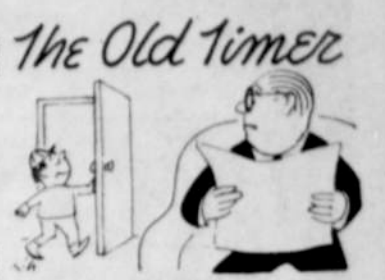
