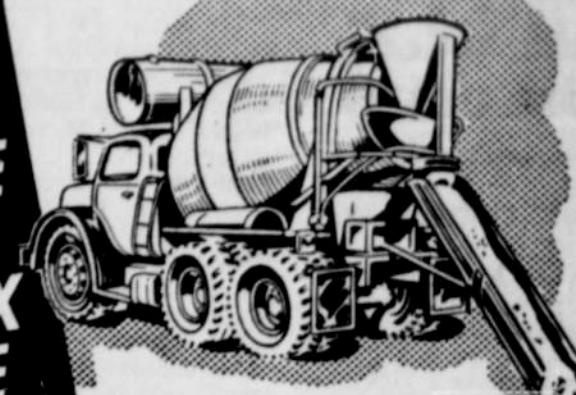

Adrian School Budget Approved

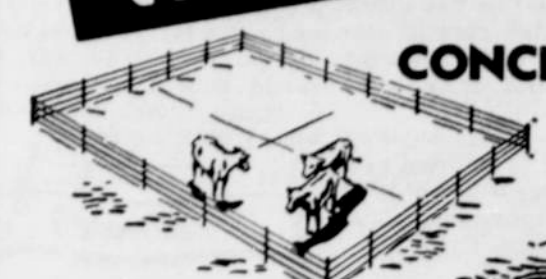
Adrian school officials recently notified the Journal that their budget has been approved by area voters.
