RIGGS ATTEND OSU EVENT

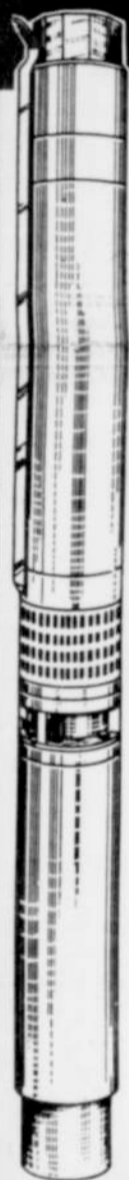

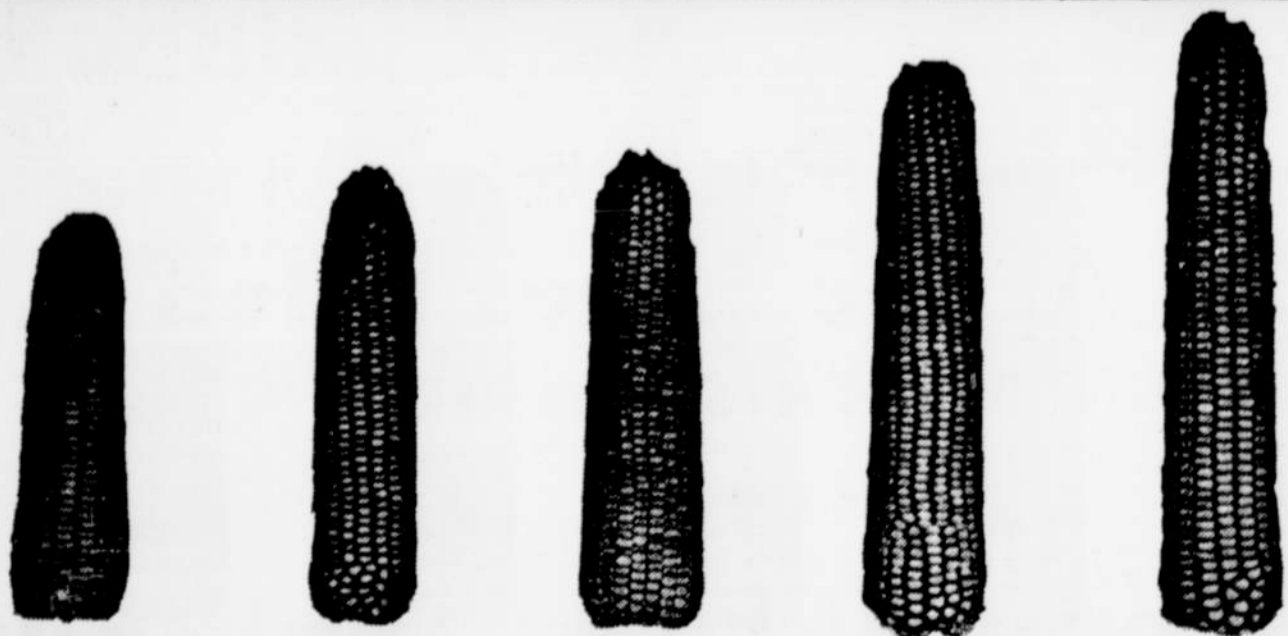
