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Game Commission Urges Protection Of State's Birds

Blessed events are happening with regularity right now all over the state and will continue through June. These blessed events are probably the most important happenings in Oregon as far as hunters and others interested in wildlife are concerned, for this is the time the wildlife resource goes through the annual expansion. Unlike humans, most wildlife reproduce on a seasonal basis, and the season is just now beginning.

Biologists for the Oregon Game Commission report that ring-necked pheasants will be born the last week in May and the first week in June. Some hatches occur later, they say, but most young pheasants come into this world during the short two - to three-week period.

counselor, commented that this grant is one of the most outstanding opportunities to be awarded a Nyssa high school graduate.

This hatch is very significant to both the pheasant population and the hunter, since this short-lived game bird experiences over a 70-percent turnover every year.

Quail and partridge are also born during late May and early June. Again, the population increase is of extreme importance since the annual turnover is similar to that of pheasants. Fawn deer also come into this world during the same short period. Elk, however, show a little more independence in their production, and the main calving season may extend a month or more, beginning about mid-May.

Waterfowl usually nest and hatch their young earlier than do upland game birds, and game biologists in eastern Oregon are already observing broods of young ducks and geese. Songbirds also start earlier, with numerous broods already off the nest. Songbirds, say the biologists, may also produce several broods a year in contrast to the single brood of waterfowl and upland birds.

Indeed, it is a happy, busy time of year for our wildlife. But the Game Commission has

another motive in advising Oregonians of these blessed events. This, too, is the time of year when Oregonians take to the out-of-doors in increasing numbers and will be encountering these wildlife youngsters throughout the fields and forests.

However, the commission advises citizens to leave these youngsters alone, not only for their own protection but for the protection of wildlife. Oregon law prohibits removing from the wild, or to keep as pets, the young of any game bird or animal. It is also illegal to capture and hold in captivity other wildlife without first obtaining a permit to do so.

And to give all possible protection to the young of wildlife, the commission also urges hunters, as well as all pet owners, to keep their dogs and cats under tight control through May, June, and July. This will give the youngsters a chance to grow without being jeopardized by roaming dogs and cats. By late summer, the youngsters will be far enough along to escape the dangers.

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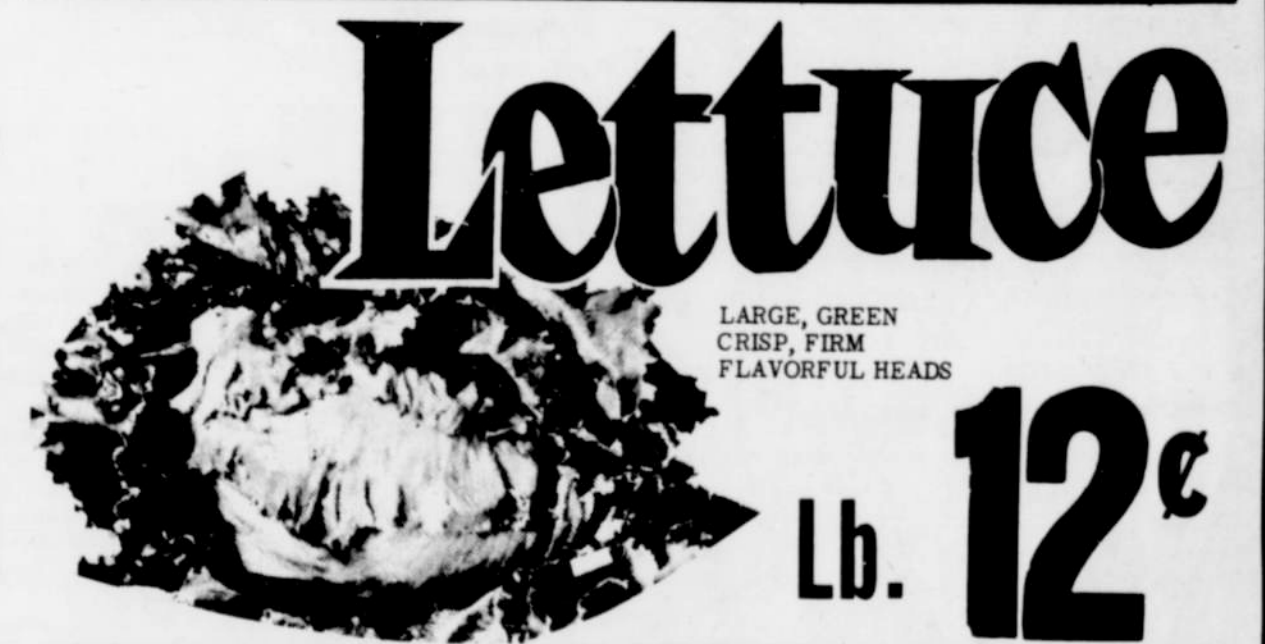
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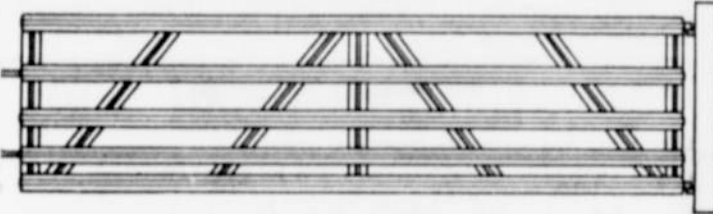


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
