School Preparation Hints Reported In OSU Bulletin

Children learn from their parents. So it's up to them to help youngsters prepare for that first big step--the day they go to school.

In a way, of course, parents have been getting their children ready ever since they were born, says Carole Honstead, Oregon State University Extension family life specialist. From parents, children learn how adults behave, and how they themselves are expected to act. Hopefully, they have achieved confidence and an ability to tackle new things.

When children understand that they're individuals -- there's no one exactly like them--it will help them see where they fit into the world outside their homes. Parents can do this by calling small children by name when they speak to them, advises Miss Honstead. Toddlers can be shown what they look like in a mirror. They learn through games -- "Who are you?" "Where do you live?"

Answer small children's questions, urges the specialist. Each answer gives them a little boost toward greater knowledge and understanding.

If children have learned to listen to their parents, they're better prepared to listen to their first formal teacher--the one at school. From the example the parents have established, youngsters will know that adults can be trusted. As a result, their first school teacher will find it easy to work with them, for she too will have their confidence.

Children can learn many things at home that will help them in school. Miss Honstead suggests teaching them to be aware of shapes--squares, circles, triangles, and colors and shades of colors. Some things have soft, or smooth, or rough textures. Different things have distinctive sounds and odors. Parents can help their children distinguish these qualities.

Outside the home, the OSU specialist suggests that children be taught about community helpers such as policemen, firemen, milk men, salesmen, druggists, postal clerks and others who serve the public. When children read about these people in books at school, they will have real meaning to them.

Even though their parents may have prepared their child-

ren in all these ways, they may still be somewhat awed by the idea of a big school. But if youngsters have seen the school before their first day as a student, it may allay some of their fears. Not until they have seen the school's size, the great number of children, its strangeness, can they realize what it's going to be like.

"If parents let their children know they believe in the school, and that they expect the youngsters to do their best there," says Miss Honstead, "they will find school a happy place, filled with many new and wonderful things to do, and friends to share it with them."
