JUNIOR BOOKS:

SPIRIT ROCKS AND SILVER MAGIC - By Phyllis Manning. The story of a typical Navajo Indian family, this book deals with their daily round of activities, their problems and beliefs.

SHUSH'MA - By Elizabeth Lauritzen. This is the story of Shush'ma, a beautiful female bear, and her experience with Navajos, trappers, Kit Carson, and finally a forest fire which causes her to flee with her cubs.

CARCAJOU - By Rutherford Montgomery. "Through the pages of this book stalks the mightiest of the wilderness villains, a freebooter and a bully, a bandit who knows nothing of fear... King to the weasel, Carcajou the wolverine has the weasel's strength and cunning..."
