On Oct. 1, 1923, he was married to Ida Nora Harris at Boise and they were remarried in 1953 in the Idaho Falls temple. The deceased was very active in work of the LDS church, and had attained the office of high priest.

The Fenns began their married life on the ranch presently owned by Sam Hartley. They resided at several locations in the area until purchasing the present home place 35 years ago.

Upon deciding to retire in 1962, Mr. Fenn sold the land to Louis Pratt, but retained the homestead. After retiring, he assisted farmers in the area when they were in need of help.

In addition to helping others, his favorite pastime was fishing and he also enjoyed trapping.

By members of his family and friends, the deceased will long be remembered for his kindness and love for his fellowman, regardless of race, creed or color.

In addition to his widow of the home, Mr. Fenn is survived by five sons, Donald of Milwaukie, Ore., Howard of Nyssa, Richard and Duane of Ontario, and Kenneth Fenn of Maple Valley, Wash.; five daughters, Mrs. Ruth Beach of St. Charles, Mo., Mrs. Elva Simpson of Gresham, Ore., Mrs. Gwendolyn Simpson, Mrs. Avanel Walker and Mrs. Carlene Savage, all of Nyssa.

OSU Professor Gives Tips On Saving For Retirement

Many couples now start their married life with a larger income--in proportion to the size of their family--than they will have again for many years. These are the college graduates.

Both the husband and the wife are likely to command good salaries, with a combined total in the \$10,000 to \$15,000 range. They really feel prosperous, and they may set their living standards pretty high.

"But see what happens," advises Dorothy Sherrill Miller, Oregon State university home management professor. "When the first baby arrives, instead of two people living on two salaries, there'll be three people living on one salary."

The second child arrives, and perhaps a third. So now there are five to live on father's salary! And while the expenses of the small children may not be too great, they really climb when the children reach high school age, she points out. And the cost of sending children to college has been rising steadily.

Couples in this stage of the family life cycle have been so busy making ends meet they often fail to make plans for the future, points out Mrs. Miller. What of retirement?

While some professional people and owners of private businesses may continue to earn past the age of 65, most employees retire at that age. Income suddenly goes down--for some, to less than half of what they were earning. But there may be 15 to 20 years of living yet to go.

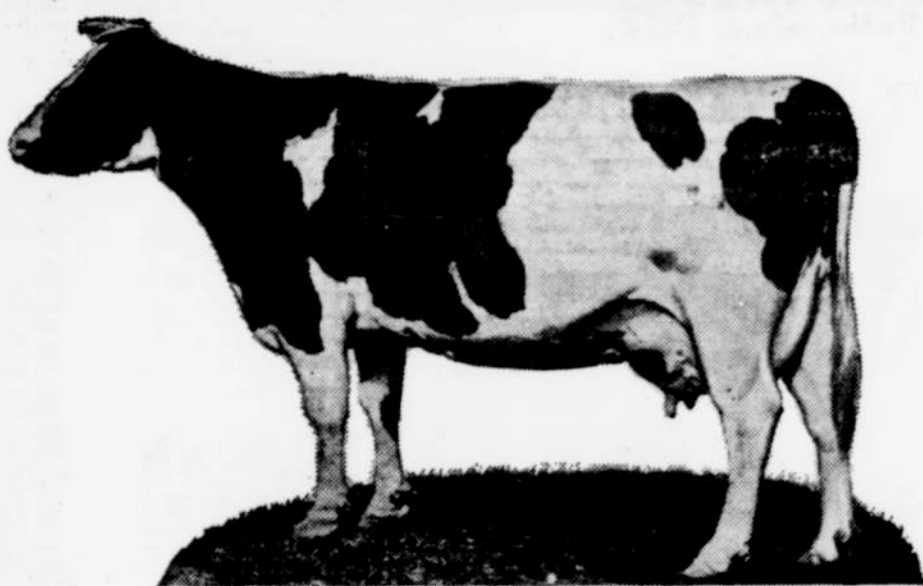
When does the couple start to save in earnest toward those years when they're no longer tied to a job? Probably when they're in their late 40's or early 50's and the children are launched on their own careers, suggests Mrs. Miller. The father's earnings are likely to continue at a relatively high level at this age, but expenses drop rapidly. The family is back to two, and these 15 or 20 years of the marriage to plan for their financial future.

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
