visited with members of the Board of Treasure Valley Community College on May 29, plans for utilizing the bond revenues had not been fully developed.

The 1967 Oregon Legislature has appropriated \$500,000 for construction at Treasure Valley Community College for the coming biennium. The Act providing the appropriation makes it possible for Treasure Valley Community College to claim their full remaining eligibility on the "Weese Building." The amount of state funds available for the "Weese Building" is not known exactly but they should approximate \$140,000. Whatever amount of state funds that are available on the "Weese Building" could be used to retire the bonded debt once it has been incurred. As an alternative, the bond issue provided sufficient reserves to fully match the state funds available for construction and the state funds could be used entirely for new construction in lieu of being applied on the bonded debt incurred to pay for the "Weese Building."

Approximately \$115,000 of assets, bequeathed to the college from the estate of the late Dr. Weese remain to be liquidated. Mr. Bill Schroeder, Chairman of the Board of Education of Treasure Valley Community College stated, with a degree of certainty, the receipts from the Weese Estate would be used to reduce the necessity of issuing bonds in the amount authorized by the amount realized from the conversion of the assets of the Weese Estate.

Numerous changes have occurred at Treasure Valley Community College in its effort to right itself financially. The Board has implemented a number of strict fiscal procedures and has pledged to the voters of the district that they will be adhered to. The Board has accepted the resignation of the President of the college and the Business Manager's contract was not renewed. A new fiscal officer has been employed by the college. The Board of Education has undergone complete reorganization with a new chairman elected. But of all the occurrences, the most notable was the willingness of the voters of the district to rescue the college from near financial collapse.

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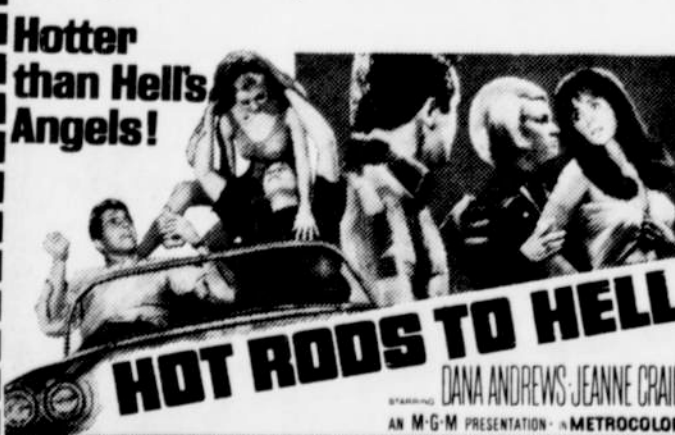
