MAJOR LEGISLATION OF INTEREST TO HARNEY AND MALHEUR COUNTIES

The question of water is of particular interest to our district. This legislature appropriated \$1,059,702 to the Water Resources board for a long-range water needs study.

This will provide facts on Oregon future needs, and is designed to prevent the diversion of Oregon water to the Southwest. The Legislature also appropriated \$14,000 for a ground-water survey in Harney County Basin.

The survey will be conducted by the State Engineer in cooperation with Harney county and the U. S. geological survey.

The \$14,000 state money, plus \$5,000 from Harney county will be matched by a federal grant of \$19,000.

Outside the legislature, another battle was won for the Eastern Oregon area regarding water, when the U. S. Forest Service backed down on its claim to all the water arising on, or flowing across, Forest Service lands.

This claim placed all water rights in jeopardy and the resultant instability retarded development of the watershed.

As Oregon's delegate to the Congressional Public Land Law Review commission, I strongly protested the Forest Service action. The Service subsequently removed the objectionable clause from its Special Use Permits.

I introduced, and the legislature subsequently approved, a Memorial to the U. S. Congress regarding the B.L.M.'s planned reduction of grazing use on public lands.

The projected grazing reduction would, if instituted, cause a drastic effect upon communities dependent upon the livestock industry. The Memorial requests the Congress to appropriate a minimum of \$3,000,000 for range rehabilitation in those areas hardest hit by forage deterioration.

The B. L. M. is requested not to impose its grazing regulations on the Malheur-Harney area in particular. While we did not pass the property tax relief package many of us had hoped would come out of this session, I am sure that the special session will do so.

Navyman Mayden Trains On Carrier

Machinist Mate Third Class Leslie W. Mayden, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. William B. Mayden of 204 Park Ave., Nyssa is serving aboard the aircraft carrier USS Randolph.

The carrier recently participated in a North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) training exercise. The Randolph was among units from the United States, Canada, the Netherlands and the United Kingdom that took part in exercises "New Look."

The training took place off the New England-Nova Scotia coast, and was designed to update shipping and ocean convoy skills, and to train NATO navies in anti-submarine warfare techniques. The carrier is homeported in Norfolk, Virginia.

The legislature passed HB 1644, which includes alfalfa seed in public warehousing provisions related to storage of grain.

Alfalfa seed has not previously been defined as grain, and had not therefore been protected by state regulations regarding public warehouse storage standards.

The result has been that many alfalfa seed growers have been forced to store their seed in warehouses in Washington and Idaho, where the alfalfa grain storage has been covered by regulations.

This bill will enable alfalfa seed growers to move their storage operations back to Oregon from Washington and Idaho.

In conclusion, I feel that this has been a very productive session for Oregon, and Malheur-Harney county area in particular. While we did not pass the property tax relief package many of us had hoped would come out of this session, I am sure that the special session will do so.
