Ratings Termed Good On Recent Aptitude Tests

Charles Quinowski, Nyssa high school guidance counselor expresses great satisfaction in score reports on recent scholastic aptitude tests (SAT).

The test was given for the first time to 22 junior students at the end of the academic year instead of their senior year. SAT is the most commonly used college entrance test required by most Oregon colleges.

It is recalled that in an article published earlier in the year, Quinowski outlined recommended changes in the college testing program.

Quinowski indicated that he is particularly pleased in class performance on this test as the examination results exceed the already high predictive scores of the preliminary scholastic aptitude tests taken last October.

Having taken the SAT students will be able to take advantage of "early decision" admission and scholarship programs.

Students that took the test earlier than has been the custom will have less frustration about acceptance to a particular school of their choice and will ultimately result in smoother transition from high school to college.

Quinowski comments that it is not possible to arrange conferences with students, on test results, at this time, as his employment period does not exceed the regular school year. He has indicated, however, that his service are available to graduated seniors having college admission problems or any student with special problems that demand immediate attention.
