NEW BOOKS LISTED AT CITY LIBRARY

The following books are now available at Nyssa Public Library, according to Mrs. Norma Urry, Librarian.

ADULT NON-FICTION

Just Around the Corner by Robert Bendiner--This highly selective history of the Thirties is a book of "sophisticated irony, relating the history and meaning of a significant decade with good humor, compassion and no little wisdom."
Drawings to Live With by Bryan Holme--One hundred forty reproductions. The author claims that drawing is perhaps the most intimate and exciting of all art forms.
The Story of the Spanish-American War by Colonel Red Reader--The author, a West Point graduate with a distinguished Army career, probes into the history of one of the least known and least understood of American wars.
Free to Live, Free to Die by Malcolm Boyd--"If you are puzzled by what religionless Christianity can mean, read this. These 'secular meditations' are beautifully and often painfully perceptive."--Bishop John A. T. Robinson.
The Spider of Brooklyn Heights by Nancy Vegliahn--This dramatic account is the story of the actual building of the 84 year-old Brooklyn Bridge, one of the great engineering feats of the nineteenth century and, from its beginning, a subject of myth and legend.

Obituaries

Walter Pinkston Mrs. Eva Gauvain

Funeral services for Walter Hugh Pinkston, a lifelong resident of Malheur county, were conducted Saturday morning, July 15, 1967 at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating were the Revs. Marlow Thompson of the Adrian Free Methodist church and Eldon Hunter of Wilder. Mr. Pinkston succumbed on the evening of July 12 at Malheur Memorial hospital in Nyssa.

He was born Oct. 1, 1886 in Baker county, Ore., which is now Malheur county. His parents, James S. and Harriett Jane Pinkston were early pioneers of the Owyhee, where the deceased spent his early boyhood and began his schooling.

In 1898, the family sold their ranch and moved to Ontario where Mr. Pinkston completed his elementary education. Three years later they moved to Long Valley where they purchased a place and raised cattle.

It was here that Mr. Pinkston spent many carefree boyhood days, for in addition to helping both his father and mother with their work, he spent many hours fishing and hunting. The family maintained a road station where they fed and lodged travelers.

In 1907 the family moved back to the Owyhee and bought what was known as the Collins ranch which they farmed for several years.

On Nov. 18, 1911, Mr. Pinkston was married at Vale, to Edith Johnston of Caldwell. They settled on the Owyhee where they farmed for several years.

The deceased was one of the early ditch riders on the then new Owyhee project and served in that capacity for ten years. He then resigned to return to his farming operations.

Mr. Pinkston was a member of Adrian Free Methodist church. Members of his family and close friends state that he will long be remembered for his thoughtfulness of others.

In addition to his widow of the home, he is survived by a son, Bruce Pinkston of Parma; two daughters, Mrs. Violet McKee of Likely, Calif., and Mrs. Ruth Sant of route 1, Nyssa.

Other survivors include a sister, Mrs. Laura Smith of Adrian, 11 grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren.

Burial was made in the Owyhee cemetery, under direction of Lienkaemper chapel.

Serving as pallbearers were Lawrence Kreager, Carl Bege-man, Klaas Laan, Dwayne Bennett, Keith Lane and Joe Nelson.

Memorial services for Mrs. Eva Gauvain, 87, were conducted Friday morning, July 14, 1967 at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating was the Rev. Wallace M. Prowell of Nyssa First Christian church.

Final rites were held and interment was made Monday at East Lawn cemetery in Minatare, Nebr.

Mrs. Gauvain succumbed last Thursday at Malheur Memorial hospital, following an extended illness.

She was born Oct. 30, 1879 in Prescott, Iowa, the fifth child of James and Mary Swim. The deceased attended schools in the Hawkeye state and on Dec. 16, 1902 was married to August Gauvain in Omaha, Nebr. They resided there for a year before homesteading in Minatare, where Mr. Gauvain operated a blacksmith shop.

Mrs. Gauvain resided at Minatare until her health failed in 1955, when she came to Oregon to live with her children. Following a paralytic stroke in 1960, she became a patient in the local nursing home.

The deceased was a member of Nyssa Methodist church and a charter member of the Minatare Methodist Woman's Society of Christian Service. She was also a charter member of the Quarter-Century club of Minatare.

Members of the family report that Mrs. Gauvain endeavored to live by the Golden Rule, and was always ready and willing to assist others when help was needed. Her favorite hobbies were knitting and reading, and she was an ardent reader of the Bible.

She is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Roy (Vera) Winchell and a stepdaughter, Mrs. Zora Osborne, both of Nyssa. Also surviving are seven grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Gauvain was preceded in death by her husband; two sons, Rex and Robert; four brothers and a sister.

Memorial gifts are being given to Malheur Memorial hospital, upon request of the family.

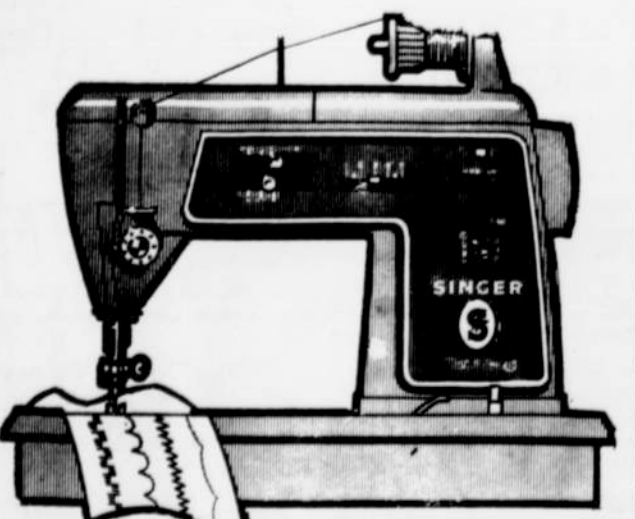
