## Oregon Wheat Production Headed For Record Level

Oregon's winter wheat crop is headed for a production record as harvest begins in Columbia Basin areas. According to the Oregon Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, prospective 1967 winter wheat production is estimated at about 39.4 million bushels—14.7 million bushels or 60 percent above the 1966 crop.

This increase is due to both a larger acreage for harvest than a year ago, and also a probable record yield of 40 bushels per acre.

Good rains and cool weather in April promoted stalling and aided yield prospects. Dry May weather seemed to have halted, for the most part, any adverse effects of striped wheat rust which was apparent in April. Hot weather in mid-June brought the wheat along fast and in areas of lighter soil and inadequate moisture, prevented heads from completely filling out.

Other grain crops also appear to be headed for high per acre yields, but total production will be down. Although the barley yield per acre is estimated at 42 bushels, total production of 13.5 million bushels is below last year due to smaller barley acreage.

Oat production is now estimated at 4.1 million bushels which compares with the 5.2 million bushels of the 1966 crop. The Oregon forecast of corn for grain is 730,000 bushels as compared with 792,000 bushels in 1966.

Hay production, at an estimated 2.3 million tons is about .2 million tons above last year's all hay yield. Oregon's ranges and pastures are offering good to excellent grazing throughout the State.

Oregon's strawberry harvest completed in most areas of Willamette valley. Hot weather and rains have reduced both yield and quality, with production at 87.1 million pounds, 9.1 million pounds below that of 1966.

Fruit prospects in Oregon remain good, except for peaches which were hurt by cool weather and poor pollination. July 1 forecasts are based on farmer reports of crop conditions and expected yields as of the first of the month.
