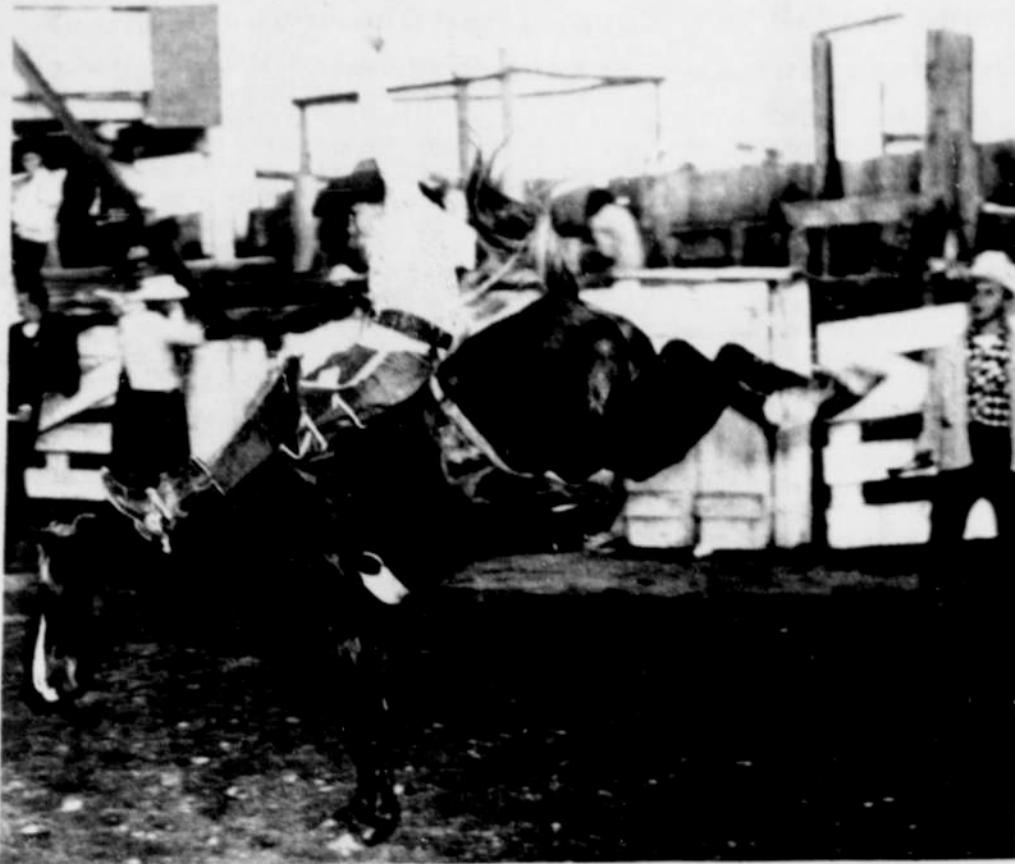

## Purchasing Power Data Given By OSU Economist

Oregonians now have more purchasing power and are in a better position to buy than they were at the first of the year, according to quarterly reports based on weekly earnings of Portland area factory workers.

These earnings, however, will not buy as much as they would have last year at this time.

A rise in retail prices and higher social security contributions have offset the slight gain in gross earnings, said Mrs. Elvera Horrell, Oregon State university extension agricultural economist.

Retail prices continue to rise slightly, but the pace has slowed somewhat due to lower wholesale food and farm prices. Wholesale and retail prices of clothing and house furnishings also continue to rise.

Services lead the price rise with medical costs up more than nine per cent over the 12-month ending in April. Household services, transportation, personal care and other such

services climbed steadily. During the past year, nearly two-thirds of the rise in the consumer price index can be directly attributed to higher service charges. Retail prices of goods now average 1.3 per cent higher than a year ago, while services average 4.5 per cent higher. (Continued on Page 5)

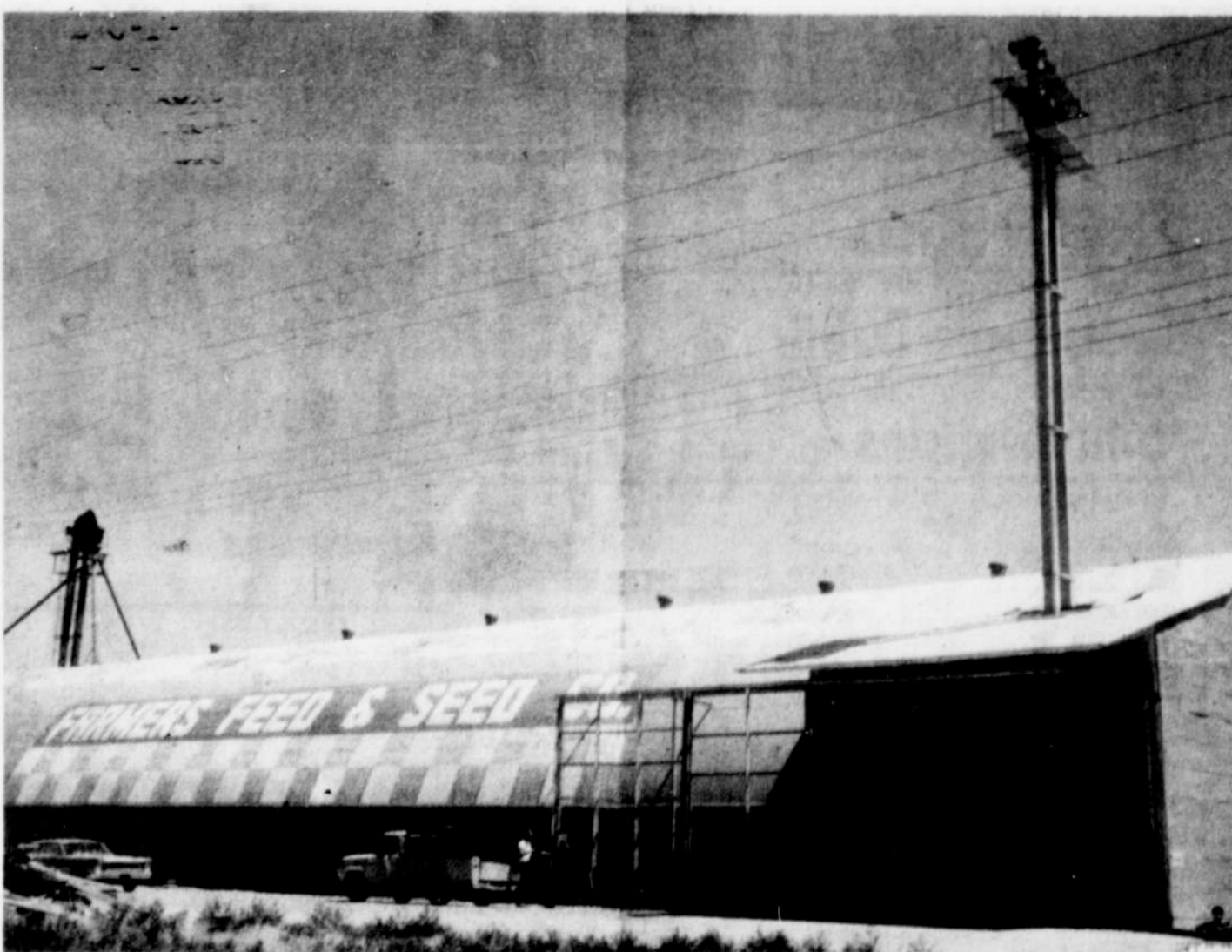
