"I would recommend inspector general duty for every officer considered for promotion to major," says Lt. Col. Ralph E. Maze, Fort Carson's new inspector general, "because of the vast knowledge of the operations of other types and facilities they would gain—more than from any other kind of assignment."

The inspector general function involves advising the commanding general on conditions relating to performance of the command's mission, the state of discipline, efficiency and economy with the command; inspection of all units and investigation of complaints.

No other section has a better opportunity to keep in touch with every aspect of environment surrounding the troops.

Fresh from a tour as deputy inspector general at Military Assistance Command headquarters in Vietnam, Colonel Maze finds he job most interesting, exciting and educational. One of its best features is that "I feel I am giving service to the troops."

This is a return trip to Fort Carson, Colo., for the Mazes as he was executive officer for 3d Brigade and, later, deputy assistant chief of staff for personnel at the mountain post before going to Vietnam.

A native of Nyssa, Colonel

Maze enlisted in 1948 and served with the 7th Cavalry Regiment in Japan until 1950, when he was selected for officer candidate school at Fort Riley, Kans.

After competing a basic infantry course at Fort Benning, Ga., he served for two years with the 101st Airborne Division training center at Camp Breckenridge, Ky.

He was in Korea with the 24th and 25th Infantry Divisions, returning to Hawaii with the latter to become advisor to the 442d Infantry Regiment, U. S. Army Pacific Hawaiian Reserve.

The Colonel is a graduate of the advanced infantry officers' course at Fort Benning and Command, and General Staff college at Fort Leavenworth, Kans.

Colonel and Mrs. Maze and their children, Kirk, Kay and Kent live at 53 Monk St. in Colorado Springs, where they plan to make their retirement home.

The inspector general's parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. E. Maze reside in Nyssa.
