

Second Marriage Success Data Given By Specialist

For one out of four brides in Oregon, it's not the first trip to the altar. Three out of four of those who are remarrying have had their previous marriage terminated by divorce.

Will this second marriage succeed? It's hard to predict, says Mrs. Roberta C. Frasier, Extension family life specialist at Oregon State University, because so much depends on why the first marriage failed.

People who are divorced, but not because of their personality defects, seem to have a good chance for a successful second marriage as those who haven't been divorced.

Some individuals who failed in their first marriage because of personality traits may succeed in their second marriage with a different kind of spouse. Others, according to Mrs. Frasier, have little chance of a successful marriage with any spouse.

Statistics indicate that each divorce increases the probability of a subsequent divorce--and sooner. While divorces are most likely to occur in first marriages within six years, marriages between previously-married parties, if they fail, will probably do so within three years.

"People seem to give up more quickly the second time around," says Mrs. Frasier.

Research sociologists in a midwestern state used census data to estimate the probability of divorce. They concluded that 80 per cent of first marriages will succeed. Marriages between partners who have been married before have a 60 per cent chance of success. But where partners have had two or more previous marriages, chances for success range from 40 down to 10 per cent.

Before divorced persons marry, professional counseling may be advisable suggests OSU's family life specialists. Exploring reasons why the first marriage failed may help prevent a breakdown in the next one.

Tips On Preparing Floral Displays For Malheur Fair

A highlight of the Malheur county fair will be flower exhibits, to be located in the armory building. Entries will be received from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon on Wednesday, August 16.

Exhibitors are reminded by Helen Dwell, Malheur county agent, that flowers for show should be picked early in the morning or late afternoon. Place flowers in deep lukewarm water and set in cool place away from any draft, overnight if possible or for several hours. Some general suggestions for selecting exhibits include:

1. Freshness - A flower should be at its most attractive stage, of good clear color with no fading or thinning of outer petals, no curling of petal edges.
2. Size - If freshness is equal choose one with greater size, more depth, more petals, more circular form.
3. Stem and Foliage - Stem strong, long enough to balance size of flower. Must have attached leaves, leaves should be crisp bright green and with no damage from insects or disease. Remove only the lower leaves which would be under water when exhibited.

Mrs. Vera Moyer and Mrs. Gillespie will serve as judges for the floral displays; and the name of another judge will be announced later. Members of the Ontario garden club will register exhibits.

The flowers will be placed in black containers when they arrive at the fairground, as this will give each entry an equal opportunity and it also shows them to best advantage.

Area garden clubs will also be making colorful booths using the theme "In Quest of Beauty". In addition to the individual floral entries there is also a class for arrangements using the following themes:

1. "Indian Summer" (exhibitor's interpretation, accessories permitted.)
2. "Garden Glory" (Fresh flowers and/or fruits and vegetables, foliage permitted.)
3. "Vacation Treasures" (Rocks and/or drift wood with fresh flowers, foliage permitted.)
4. "Summertime" (Mass arrangement, made with fresh plant materials.)
5. "Witches Brew" (Arrangement in teapot or other kitchen utensil.)
6. "Hot Summer" (Dry or artificial arrangement.)
7. "Holiday Mood" (Any season.)
