It's Your Law

ADOPTION AFTER DIVORCE

In a divorce action Jim was ordered to pay \$50 a month to his former wife, Helen, for the support of their only child, Jim, Jr., whose custody was granted to Helen.

Later Helen remarried and her new husband wanted to adopt her son, Jim, Jr. The boy's father gave his written consent to the adoption.

After the adoption Jim, Sr. refused to pay any more support money to Helen, claiming the adoption wiped out his obligation to pay the \$50 a month to Helen. She insisted the divorce decree meant what it said, and that he would have to pay her \$50 a month until the boy was of age. She had her former husband cited into court for contempt for failure to pay the support payments.

Do you think the adoption did cancel the father's obligation to pay support money ordered in the divorce?

The court held the decree of adoption did cancel the father's obligation to pay support money decreed in the divorce.

In the absence of a specific agreement by the natural parent to continue to contribute to the child's support after adoption, the parent's obligation to contribute to the child's support ends when the order of adoption is entered.
