beef and pork are up from recent months. A bright spot, from the consumer standpoint, is turkey. Heavy supplies may be reflected in attractive prices at retail stores.

Although egg prices rise during the summer, this year they are expected to stay well below 1966's high level.

A large tuna catch, and larger-than-usual stocks of canned salmon should result in the "sale" tag being hung on these two protein foods. Watch for specials on your favorite brands, advises Mrs. Seat.

In spite of increased costs, the per cent of disposable income spent for food at home this year should be down from last year, OSU's food marketing specialist says.

Consumers spent 18 per cent of their take-home pay for food in 1966—but this year 17.5 per cent is expected to cover families' expenditures on purchases of food for home consumption.

BURNING WARNING

It has come to my attention that some people are burning garbage in burn barrels. The Ordinances of the City of Nyssa prohibits such action.

We must ask you to confine the burning of any refuse to such material which is combustible and will not generate noxious odors.

We must also remind you that burning barrels are to be supplied with a heavy wire screen across the top so as to prevent any burning materials from being blown about.

The Code of the City of Nyssa makes it unlawful for any person to discharge an air gun, or to use any bean shooter, sling shot or other similar devices.

GOVERNMENT CONTROLS?

Will government ever accept the fact that business taxes are an imposed cost of product that only the government can control?

Will government ever learn that a reduction of these taxes is a multiplier factor that holds prices to a minimum and does not automatically inflate profits?

Will government ever learn that a corporate income tax is really a personal income tax really a personal income tax doubly assessed, first on the and then on the individual shareholder's dividends?

Actually government cannot tax business per se. It can only increase the cost which is then necessarily reflected in increased prices and reduced taxable personal income of the shareholder owners.

Portland Firm Buys Idaho S & L Assets

Equitable Savings and Loan Association of Portland has purchased \$7,694,000 in assets of Idaho Savings and Loan Association, which was closed last July and taken over by the Idaho State Finance Department.

Ralph H. Cake, chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Equitable said the purchase would mean paying an estimated 43% on the dollar to the 16,000 depositors who had accounts totaling about \$20 million. Idaho Commissioner of Finance John D. Silva, announced there was hope that the depositors will eventually recover additional amounts as further sales are made. He is statutory trustee for the Idaho firm and had high praise for Equitable's initiative in taking over the large block of assets which includes loans, furniture, fixtures and real estate of the defunct organization.

Equitable's purchase must be approved by the Third District U. S. Federal Court, but does not require approval of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board.

Payments to depositors and claimants will start within 30 days, and Equitable will operate branches in Boise, Twin Falls, Pocatello and Idaho Falls. Idaho S & L had offices at the four centers, and plans call for Equitable taking over all of the existing offices within three months.

Founded in 1890, Equitable has operated every business day for over 76 years, including the Depression of the 30s and the bank holiday. The Portland association now has 33 offices in Oregon, Washington and Idaho. It has been operating in Idaho since 1897 and is currently authorized to make loans in 20 of the 44 Idaho counties, including those where Idaho S & L offices are located. Equitable has assets of more than \$280 million and reserves exceeding \$21 million.

The purchase by Equitable was one of four alternatives considered by the Idaho Department of Finance. The others were reorganization of the defunct company with control in a shareholder association, liquidation of the assets, and sale of the federally insured loans to eight insurance companies with the uninsured assets liquidated. The shareholders association "unanimously concurred" in the sale to Equitable. (Oregon Votes)
