Outlook Told

The job outlook for the Malheur-Harney area remains good. There are some curtailments in food processing and, also, in specialized wood products.

Potato harvesting started the latter part of July. Most growers report the season from ten day to two weeks later than usual. Harvest at present is limited to handpicking for fresh pack. Prices are fair. The early picking reveals that the potatoes are smaller than usual, although, otherwise of good quality. Grade A sizes are running to much smaller percentages.

Building, including house construction, remains very active. Building permits in the city of Ontario totalled \$1,191,525 up to July first of this year. Several highway projects are in various stages of completion throughout the area.

Sales and services are at peak proportions. Many retail establishments are remodeling and enlarging their facilities to better serve the public.

JOB OUTLOOK

Callbacks to fresh packing and food processing are expected to provide jobs for any labor surplus which may exist. Corn processing, both canning and fresh freezing will commerce early in the month with prospects very good for a bumper crop. The good outlook for jobs is expected to continue throughout the next three months.

UNEMPLOYMENT

Unemployment is rapidly declining within the area and is expected to reach the irreducible minimum within the month.
