

FCIC Agent Reports On Crop Protection

Harvest-time is the time of year when the farmer determines whether he personally won or lost in playing his role of producing food and fiber for his community, the nation and the world.

For the farmer there is no guaranteed payday. In his business the major consistency is "uncertainty." The farmer and his family are today involved in a fast-changing, high-risk occupation. Increasing production expenses and capital investments have made the pencil more important than the plow in determining the farm family's future and potential for profit.

Worry and hope continue to be a farmer's most constant companions. Weather perils, insects and crop disease can abruptly or slowly cancel out hours and dollars of investment.

At this time of year when harvest is or will be uppermost in the farming communities of the Northwest is also the time for farmers to be thinking about protection for their 1968 crop year. In many counties of Oregon, Washington and Idaho the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation will be offering increased protection to policyholders.

J. Ford Anderson, District Director for the FCIC in this area, invites farmers and others who share in crops to contact their local FCIC agent for information about the many valuable features of a Federal Crop Insurance contract. Anderson also stated that current policyholders should have received their Summary of Protection by now and he urges policy holders to carefully check their 1967 crop year production with the guarantee shown on the Crop Summary.

If the producer notes his production is below the guarantee, he should immediately contact the local FCIC agent so that a Notice of Crop Loss can be prepared.

The deadlines for reporting a crop loss can be found by policyholders referring to their FCIC contract and crop endorsement.
