OREGON TEACHER SUPPLY, DEMAND NEARER BALANCE

Some Oregon school district budget problems this spring apparently caused teachers to make "a few more" inquiries of Oregon State university's placement listings.

But, according to Mrs. Kathryn H. Smith, OSU associate professor in charge of teacher placement, there was not the wholesale jumping to other district teaching jobs where budgets seemingly had less trouble.

Generally, Mrs. Smith observed, teachers are a stable group. Nowadays they are more reluctant to pull up stakes.

In addition there appears to be a leveling off of "supply and demand" for teachers in Oregon, though there are certain subject matter areas still experiencing a shortage, she noted.

Industrial arts, women's physical education, foreign language, math, agriculture, physics, special education, and reading are subjects for which qualified teachers are in short supply, OSU placement office records indicate.

"But," Mrs. Smith emphasized, "there are more teachers than there are jobs for those qualified in boys' physical education, social science, biology, general science and speech."

LESS SHORTAGE

And this year there apparently is not as great a shortage of elementary school teachers as has been the past decade. Those graduates with elementary teaching certificates were unable to "pick and choose" jobs as in the past.

According to the OSU placement office, one superintendent reported this year he was able to fill the teaching vacancies "without moving from my desk -- I didn't have to go recruiting. They came to me."

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There also seems to be some leveling off in certain teaching areas in California. "Not as many of the new graduates are getting jobs in California. Particularly in the high schools. That state requires secondary teachers to have nine credit hours beyond the bachelor's degree," she noted.

Placement records show this year's OSU graduates have taken teaching jobs in numerous states—"as far north as Nome, Alaska," with salaries ranging from \$5800 to \$5900, and some as high as \$6800.

Mrs. Smith reminded, however, that those who were experiencing difficulty in finding jobs, were in the areas of over supply or were limited as to locale.

She noted national research is available on "Supply & Demand of Teachers" for advisors, counselors and students.

"a spite of the warnings," she concluded, "the students go blithely on their ways preparing themselves to teach in subjects where there is an over-supply."

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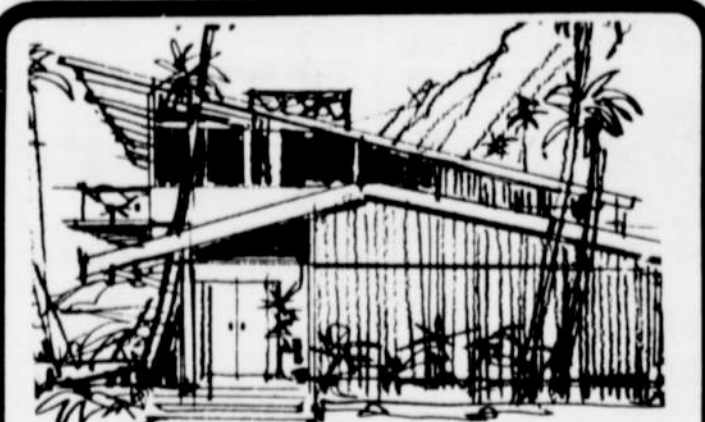
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
