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THE SPORTSMAN CAN HELP

With hunting seasons approaching, many requests for "No Hunting" and "Hunting by Permission Only" signs have been brought to us.

Each year at this time, the Sportsman finds many new areas posted, many of these prime game yield areas. This is not the fault of the land owner, but the fault of some hunter who had abused the privilege of hunting on private land.

Granted, not all hunters, but in actuality only a small number of hunters, cause this serious trespass and depredation problem with the land owners, by their neglect of the few basic rules of consideration, respect and caution; so here in Baker county we are not faced with as many posted areas as near the larger metropolitan areas of western Oregon where a sportsman may drive for miles before finding even a "Hunting by Permission Only" area.

"Hunting by Permission Only" means just that! Chances are if you ask the land owner for permission to hunt on his land, he will give it to you. He will also probably set down a list of "don'ts" to follow when on his property. His cattle and crops and property need these rules if he is to protect them. A good sportsman at all times willingly helps a rancher with whatever policy the rancher must adopt.

When approaching a house to gain hunting permission, leave your gun and dogs in the rig. Be polite, and remember that if you get the rancher's permission to hunt on his lands, you are his guest.

If an area, because of livestock or some previous depredation, is posted with "No Hunting" or "No Trespassing" signs, STAY OUT! Don't aggravate the situation further by breaking the law and annoying the land owner. With proper treatment, some lands may again be opened in seasons to come when the owner again feels that he can do so.

Use common sense and respect the rights of the land owners when hunting. Help him in keeping the land unposted, and the sportsman in the field. Help identify vandals, help to discourage depredation by others and carelessness with fire, or recklessness with firearms on private property or the waste of game or any other resource.

When you return home, you may or may not have a bag limit of game, but your lasting satisfaction will be without limit if you have had a full day of sportsmanship and a day of cordiality between yourself and all of those with whom you have come in contact.
