They are living just northeast of Nyssa where their new shop is located. They do all types of upholstery, their slogan is 'Your Satisfaction is Our Success'.

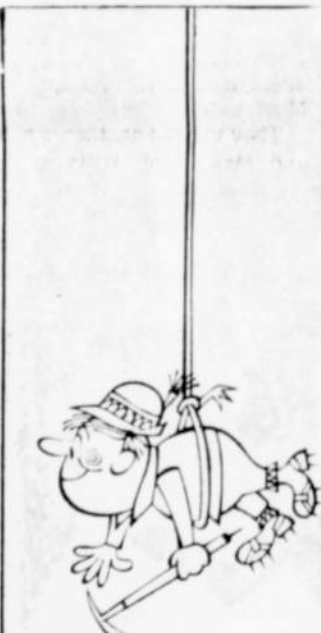
The Rush couple is not new to the area. He was raised at Weiser and Mrs. Rush at Payette.
