FERN P. RUNCORN

Funeral services for Fern P. Runcorn were conducted Wednesday afternoon, December 13, 1967 at Lienkaemper chapel.

Mr. Runcorn succumbed on the previous Monday afternoon at Malheur Memorial hospital, following an extended illness. He was born Oct. 1, 1886 at Plainfield, Wis., a son of O. J. and Emma L. Spees Runcorn.

The deceased moved from Wisconsin to Salem in 1900 and was married Feb. 11, 1917 to Lucille McPeck in the Oregon capital city.

They lived in the Salem area until 1946 when they came to the Nyssa community. Mr. Runcorn was a railroad man until 1925, and then began farming.

He was a member of the Oregon Trail Grange and Nyssa Senior Citizens' organization. His favorite hobby was hiking. And according to members of the family, his creed was "Let Me Live In A House By The Side Of The Road - And Be A Friend To Man."

In addition to his widow of the home, Mr. Runcorn is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Lloyd E. (Lela) Lundy of Eugene, Ore.; a daughter-in-law, Mrs. James E. Mitchell; three grandchildren and three great-grandchildren. A son, Robert E. Runcorn preceded him in death on June 4, 1954.

The funeral rites were conducted by the Rev. Ralph A. Lawrence of Nyssa Methodist church, with Mrs. Donald (Bonnie) Sappe as vocalist.

Interment was made in the Nyssa cemetery. Active pallbearers were Ward C. Lundy, Leonard Phillips, Loyd Adams, Frank Sherwood, A. A. Jamieson and Adam Focht.
