WORK SMARTER - NOT HARDER

Sprucing up for the holidays? Upholstered furniture with stain resistant finish may, in time, require a general cleaning, especially on chair arms and headrest.

The best all-around cleaner is water with a small amount of detergent or ammonia added, advises Mrs. Dorothy Brown, Oregon State University Extension home furnishings specialist. Wipe the soiled areas with a moistened cloth, but avoid soaking or harsh rubbing. A dry cleaning fluid may be needed for areas soiled by body or hair oil. Sponge lightly, avoid soaking or rubbing. Make sure there is adequate ventilation.

If this doesn't do the trick, you may need a foam cleaner. Check the instructions for correct usage. Wipe the cleaned area thoroughly with a damp sponge or cloth to remove all traces of the cleaner. If foam cleaner is left on, the effectiveness of finish to repel stains may be destroyed. -B. Strawn, OSU Extension Specialist.
