## Holiday Baking Tips Outlined

The rush of Christmas shopping, extra guests and routine housework leaves no time for holiday baking failures. Avoid them by proper use of oven utensils, advises Bernice Strawn, Extension home management specialist at Oregon State University.

of pan used can make a big difference in results, Miss Strawn points out.

First, the pan should be the right size. Check the recipe for proper dimensions. If the pan is too large, the batter won't rise to the top where it can brown.

Dull-finished metal or glass cake pans give good results. Glass, however, absorbs and holds the heat, so set the oven thermostat 25 degrees lower than when baking in metal pans, she suggests.

Cookies should be baked in a pan with low sides. High sides cut off the circulation of hot air so that tops of cookies don't brown.

If the cookie sheet touches the sides or back of the oven, the flow of heat will be blocked. Browning will be uneven.

Baking a big batch of cookies? Speed up the process by placing them on a sheet of aluminum foil. As a pan of cookies comes out of the oven, slip the sheet of unbaked cookies onto the pan and into the oven without delay. Or use heavy foil without a pan, says Miss Strawn.

Choose a pie pan such as glass, which absorbs and holds

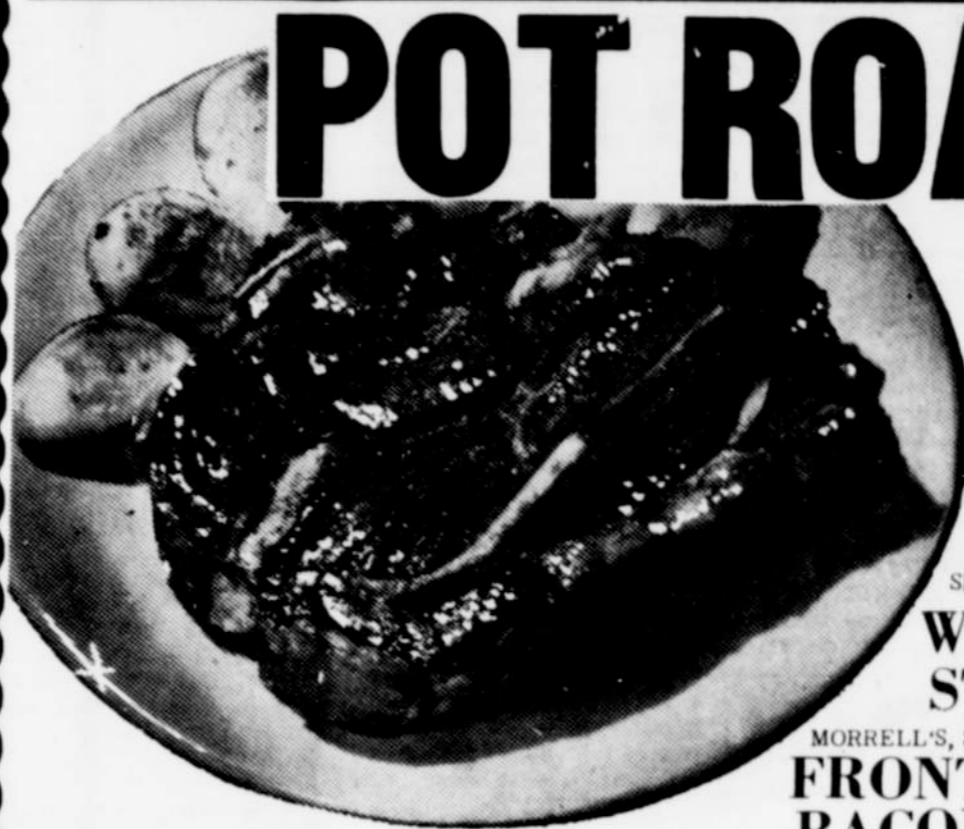
heat, to get good browning of the bottom crust of pies, suggests Miss Strawn. Place pies slightly below the center of the oven to get more thorough baking on

the bottom.

When baking several pies or layers of cakes at one time, using both oven racks, place them so that no pan is directly over another, Miss Strawn advises. Good circulation of heat is important in getting the kind of baked foods you want to serve your special guests.

You're all ready to start dinner but the oven doesn't heat? Check the automatic oven time clock. If the control was used, but not returned to "manual" setting, this could be the problem. Or perhaps you've just cleaned the oven. Did you push the heating unit all the way in when you were through?

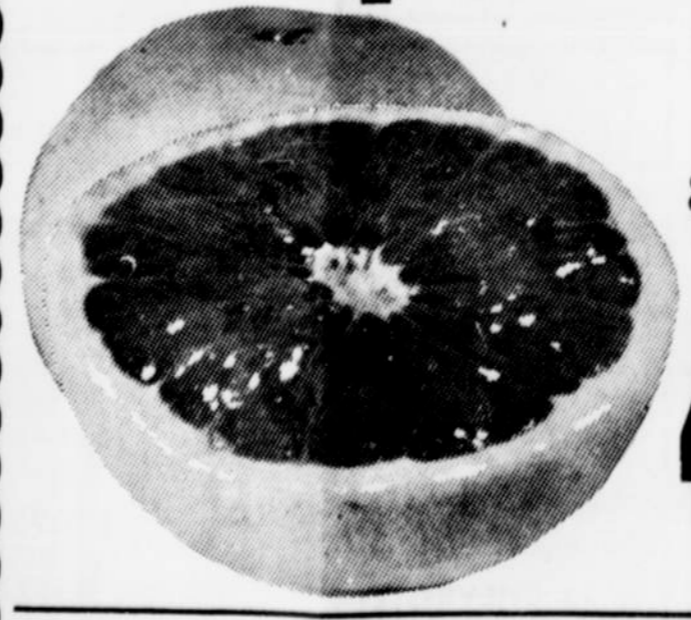
