LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Nyssa Friends:

Maligayang Pasko!!! That's Merry Christmas in our language! I've wanted to write earlier, but I have hardly settled back at home when I had to leave again for a month to screen candidates for AFS 1968-69! I went to five cities, becoming ill in one city and having a serious relapse in another city before coming home! We still have interviews until December 22, so I thought it best to sit down and write this Christmas letter!

My pictures of my visit to Nyssa turned out quite well (good of Instamatic!) and my family and friends always hear about my VERY SHORT visit. Well, maybe next year I can stay in Nyssa for a week! There were still many friends I wanted to visit and call, but 22 hours were not enough last September!

We have fund-raising campaigns and Christmas caroling, and I have about 150 Evaluations of candidates and Evaluations of 35 American students who stayed here for the summer. Aside from that, we've been trying to clean the office!!! (groan!) As if I haven't enough to do, I am also enrolled this semester at the Far Eastern University (\$7,000 students!) every Monday, Wednesday and Friday!

All radio stations (more than 25) in the city are playing Christmas carols, so with other stations in the provinces. All department stores are all decked out for the holidays, kids run around in new dresses with new toys, parties here and there, people with packages, etc. All these in contrast to the Christmas of our poor. We had our elections last month for Senators, and local officials.

As usual, candidates promised a lot of things, especially to the poor (which constitute the majority of our 33 million population). But we don't know and can't tell how many of them will fulfill their pledges to help them. As my small contribution, I am participating this Christmas vacation in a civic organization's campaign for food and clothing for the underprivileged. AFS returnees are thinking of putting up a similar project so I will also have an active part in that.

It is getting cooler, especially in early morning and in the

evenings. From Dec. 16, people are attending midnight mass and will continue to do so until Christmas day. Our celebration lasts until Jan. 6.

I have so many things to be thankful for, and I feel very lucky to be stuck with a family like mine. I would say 'families', as I have many in the United States and around the Philippines, but I'm especially proud of my own family. My mother has given up hoping for one of us to be SANE! They told me that they missed me while I was gone last September and November, as it was so quiet here. We'll be together this Christmas though, and that is just the greatest gift we could ask for.

Maybe I could wish for a "Christmas in Nyssa", but that is quite impossible, so I'll settle for this Christmas letter for my Nyssa friends instead.

Again, I want everybody to know that it was so great to be able to visit Nyssa and my good friends again, and on my next visit I'll spend more time there so I can see others I missed.

I hope everybody is in good health and have joyful holidays.

Funeral services for Laura Savilla Goode, niece of Nyssa Mrs. John E. Long, were conducted Saturday morning, Dec. 16, 1967 at the Little Chapel of the Chimes in Portland.
