A well-balanced scoring attack by the Nyssa Bulldogs netted them a Dec. 22, 68-66 District 7A-2 and a Snake River Valley basketball victory over the Vale quintet.

The contest was the first in Oregon district play for both clubs, while both teams sport 1-1 records in the SRV. Overall Vale is 2-2, while Nyssa is 1-3.

Rick Johnson, of Vale, rated as one of the best in the valley, led the Vikings with 27 points while team mate Steve Kennison chipped in with 22.

Gary Ross paced Nyssa with 14 while Jim Beck had 12, Colin Chester 11, and Dan Wilson 10, Larry Wilson, 8; Reid Saito, 7; Scott Jefferies, 6.

Nyssa broke the game open late in the game with a control-type game. The Bulldogs were especially strong in the final period in controlling the boards and wound up out rebounding Vale 36-22.

From the floor Nyssa was also tops hitting at a 53 per cent while Vale was some 20 percentage points lower.

Grabbing a 15-12 lead in the first period the Bulldogs never trailed once in the game.
