

### TVCC Director Of Migrant Education Explains Program

Bob Patterson, director of the migrant education program at TVCC, told the Ontario Branch of the American Association of University Women at their January 8 meeting in Vale that the migrant education program has completely changed since TVCC first applied and received a grant under the Office of Economic Opportunity.

He stated that three years ago the program dealt only with the education of children, and in Malheur county this was done in co-operation with the schools in Nyssa, Ontario and Vale and the program largely provided the school for these youngsters.

Last year, according to Patterson, federal requirements for the program were reversed and the schools, through the department of Health Education and Welfare, were given the responsibility of the program's education of the children. The programs, such as that at TVCC, were given the responsibility of programs for adult migrants.

In defining a migrant, and thus explaining who is eligible to participate in the program, Patterson told the group that a man (or head of a household) must have derived at least 50% of last year's income from agriculture, had two or more employers and have received less of income than the recognized level of poverty.

Nationally does not enter in. However, in Malheur County most migrant families are of Mexican descent.

Patterson outlined to the group how the newly organized program operates. He said that three units, known as Opportunity Centers were established in the migrant hubs of Malheur and Washington counties. Centers are in Ontario, serving Ontario, Vale, Nyssa and Weiser. These centers are staffed with a director, who incidentally is very fluent in speaking and writing Spanish, plus a man and woman aide. These aids are of Mexican descent and are bi-lingual.

These centers provide migrant families with a number of services. They serve as classrooms for courses in English, homemaking skills, crafts, general education and GED classes.

They offer a counseling service to refer the migrants to other services available in the community such as those

able. Twenty-three students, migrants or children of migrants, are enrolled as full-time students in the vo-t-e-c-l-e-r transfer program at TVCC. They receive full-tuition, fees and books.

Patterson feels that the program is very rewarding but says that many in the community feel that a man with little or no previous education should emerge from a five-month course as a well educated man. He pointed out that it was not possible.

He agreed with the group that the cost of the program is great but pointed out that welfare costs are undoubtedly higher.

During the business meeting Mary Patrick, Ruth Ingebritsen and Beth Magrini were elected as members of a nominating committee.

The group also agreed to secure pictures for some of the rooms at Holy Rosary hospital. Mrs. Jan Barton of Nyssa is chairman and ask anyone having suitable prints or pictures to donate to contact her.

The Feb. 12 meeting will be at the Patrick home in Ontario, and the program will be on cultural interests.

Personal property taxpayers are required to file an invoice as of January 1, 1968 with the Assessor for an assessment base. Assessment must be filed on or before March 2, 1968. A penalty is provided for late filing.

- Log Inventories: Cold decks and ponds, also felled and bucked logs in the woods.
- Automotive and Trailer House Inventories.

### NOTICE - NOTICE

\*Items held in stock for sale or to be included in a sale are eligible for Inventory Tax Relief whereas maintenance supplies are not eligible. These MUST be separated on the return.

The law does not permit the assessor to allow the reduction in inventory value for tax relief under certain circumstances when the personal property report is not accurately prepared or is filed after March 2.

Any person who has not had an opportunity to report by Mail or personal contact may obtain the forms at the office of the assessor.

It is necessary that these forms be signed and filled out in detail in order to receive equitable assessment. The Assessor's office will be willing to help with the proper filing of the forms.

ORS 308.105 makes it the responsibility of the taxpayer to file these reports or incur the penalty provided by law.
