Yastrzemski, voted Associated Press's "Male Athlete of the Year for 1967", led the underdog Red Sox to the American League pennant. He had the top batting average, .326, the top runs batted in, 121, and tied with Minnesota's Harmon Killebrew for most home runs, 44.
