Knife & Fork Club Speaker Dr. Overman, educational consultant for the Oak Ridge, Tenn., Technical Enterprises, Inc., and consulting scientist, will be guest speaker at the Feb. 3 meeting of Knife and Fork club patrons. The dinner meeting is scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m. at East Side cafe in Ontario. Subject of Dr. Overman's talk will be "Which Way the Atom?" He helped train almost 6 thousand scientists, engineers, teachers and physicians while serving as chairman of the special training division at the Oak Ridge Institute of Nuclear Studies for seventeen years. He is a Fellow in the American Association for the Advancement of Science and also in the American Nuclear Society. He went to Oak Ridge in 1944 with the Atomic Bomb project. His talk promises to be stimulating, as well as eye-opening, as Dr. Overman is a recognized scientist who is tops in his profession. He is also noted as a delightful and accomplished speaker.
