**JIM C. HOUSTON** (on right), a Navyman from the Arcadia area near Nyssa, is being awarded the Purple Heart Medal for wounds sustained in a recent battle between the U. S. Mobile Riverine Force and Viet Cong guerrillas in the Mekong Delta of Vietnam. Fireman Houston, 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil R. Houston and a graduate of Nyssa high school is being presented the award by Captain Robert S. Salzer, Commander of River Assault Flotilla One, in ceremonies at the Dong Tam Army Base in the heart of the delta. The riverine force is temporarily headquartered at the army base while it's flagship, the USS Benewah, undergoes routine repairs. The Benewah and four other ships act as a mobile base for the flotilla's assault boats and two battalions of the 2nd Brigade, 9th Infantry Division, U. S. Army. In a typical operation such as the one in which Houston was wounded, the Army forces are transported into battle by Navy armored troop carriers (ATC's), versatile 56-foot converted landing craft. Each of these boats is capable of carrying one platoon of fully equipped infantrymen through the intricate network of waterways and rice paddies that is the Mekong Delta.
