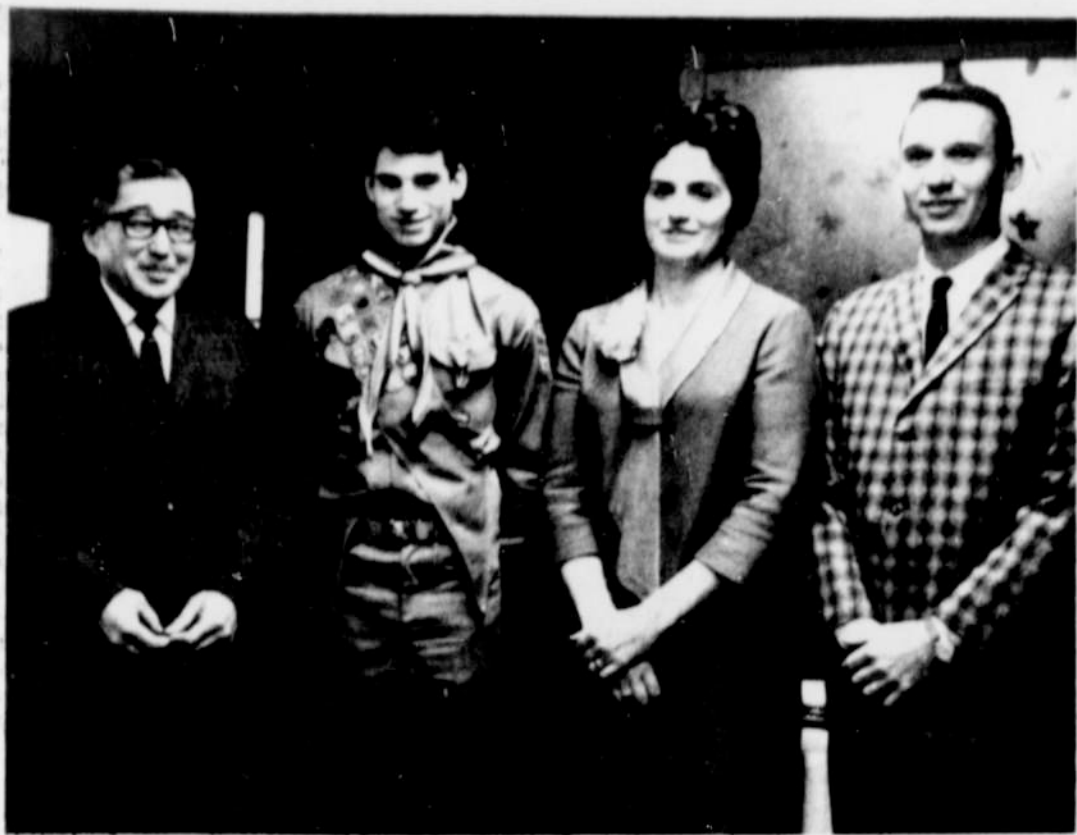


EARNS TOP SCOUT AWARD

CLARK METCALF
Entertains Students

Culture pervaded NHS at a February 12 national assembly when Clark Metcalf demonstrated various types of guitar music. Elementary students attended a similar program at 1 p.m., on February 9.

First period classes convened at 8:50 a.m. in the gymnasium, where Metcalf presented variations in guitar structure and techniques in various parts of the world. He began with hillbilly music and

progressed through blues, folk, and jazz tunes up to classical guitar. The guitarist displayed four types of instruments and demonstrated their sounds and uses. The classic style, a solo guitar, was used most frequently during the assembly. He exhibited the flamenco guitar, an accompaniment instrument. Due to its steel strings, the Spanish guitar proved to have a louder, more metallic sound. The Old English lute, a forerunner of the modern guitar, showed its versatility.

Metcalf began studying the guitar in high school, and after being drafted, continued in the Navy. Much of his time is spent away from his Lincoln, Nebr., home since he joined the National School Assemblies program two years ago. However, he says he feels that it is worth the time and effort. Metcalf commented, "It's fun and very rewarding. I enjoy playing for students, and in turn I'm learning more and more." - Angie Labby, NHS Bulldog staff.

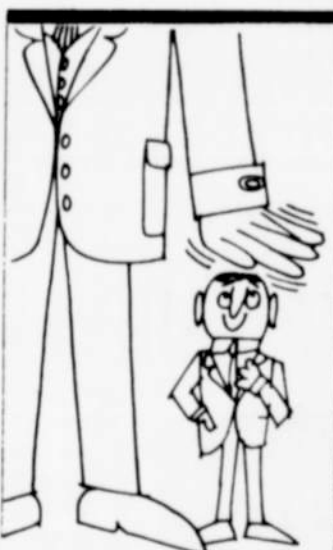

Funeral services for Edmund Warren, a lifetime resident of Nyssa, were conducted Tuesday, Feb. 13, 1968 at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating was the Rev. Ralph A. Lawrence of Nyssa Methodist church.

Mr. Warren, 74, succumbed Friday at Malheur Memorial hospital, following an extended illness.

He was born Oct. 13, 1894 at Nyssa, and on Dec. 26, 1919 was married to Harriet Kirk at Shoshone, Idaho.

He was a retired carpenter and had worked as custodian at the Nyssa schools. His favorite hobbies were fishing and gardening. To his family he was known as a devoted husband and father.

An account of the death of Mrs. Sam C. (Dottie G.) Parks was carried in the January 11, issue of the Gate City Journal.

Information for a complete obituary was not available at that time, and is now being published as it appeared in the Yakima Daily Republic, together with other information provided by members of the family.

Funeral services for Mrs. Dottie G. Parks, 39, of 915 S. 27th Ave., Yakima, Wash., were conducted at 11 o'clock Wednesday morning, Jan. 10, 1968 at Shaw and Sons chapel. Officiating was the Rev. William Cooley, associate pastor of the Yakima First Christian church.

Mrs. Parks succumbed Jan. 7 in St. Elizabeth hospital, after suffering a sudden heart attack. The deceased was born June 29, 1928 at Lennora, Kans., a daughter of Louis Linn and Nora Ethel Booth. She attended Nyssa elementary schools and for a number of years was employed at the Nyssa Food Center.

The Parks family moved from Nyssa to Yakima about two and one-half years ago.

In addition to Mr. Parks of the home, the deceased is survived by six daughters, Mrs. Mark (Kris) Ward of Nyssa, Becky Sue, Paula Jo, Candy Rae, Darlie and Larla Parks at home; and one son, Timothy Parks, also of the home.
