

## Dr. George Rush To Head Sugar Beet Technologists

Dr. George Rush, director of agricultural research for the Amalgamated Sugar company, was elected president of the American Society of Sugar Beet Technologists in Phoenix Wednesday (February 21).

The 47 year-old native of Canada will serve two years as chief executive of the international organization. The society's membership includes the beet industry's leading scientists, research analysts and agronomists.

More than 800 delegates from sugarbeet producing countries all over the world are attending the week-long ASSBT meeting in Phoenix.

Dr. Rush is recognized as one of the best-informed students of sugarbeet storage problems. Preserving beets after they are harvested is a major concern for most processors. Rush estimates the loss of recoverable sugar in beet piles cost the industry more than 30 million dollars in 1967.

He has pioneered experiments in controlled atmosphere storage of beets, which are grown in 23 states.

The new society president also is conducting long-term studies of agricultural chemical applications and effects. While herbicides and insecticides are a boon to the nation's farmers in their battle against weeds, insects and crop diseases, many agronomists are concerned with the threat of chemical overuse. Chemical residues left in the soil also may pose serious problems for later crops.

Amalgamated's research director was born and raised in Vancouver, B.C. He obtained a master's degree in agronomy from the University of British Columbia in 1947 and a PhD in genetics and agronomy from the University of Wisconsin in 1950.

He joined Amalgamated in the latter year and assumed complete responsibility for the company's agricultural research and development activities in 1963. For several years before this, Rush was in charge of the company's main agricultural research station at Nyssa, Oregon.

One of the doctor's continuing assignments is the development of high production and disease resistant sugarbeet strains, which are then developed as seed crops. Amalgamated contracts with more than 4,000 growers in Oregon, Idaho and Utah each year, and will supply beet seed for an estimated 150,000 acres of production in 1968.
