Farm Bureau Creates Tri-State Service On Marketing Potatoes

Russell Howard, Yakima, Wash., has been named manager of a new potato marketing information service sponsored by Farm Bureaus in Oregon, Washington and Idaho. Headquarters will be in Boise.

The marketing service was officially launched last month as a program of the American Agricultural Marketing association, an affiliate of the American Farm Bureau federation, according to Claude Williams, Prineville, OFBF president.

Howard's work will be guided by a six-member tri-state potato marketing advisory committee, who in turn will receive recommendations from potato marketing committees within each state. Haakon Thomsen, Warden, Wash., is chairman.

Larry Dowers, Madras, who heads Oregon's potato marketing committee and is also a member of the tri-state committee, said that the potato marketing service will fill the need in the Pacific Northwest to keep growers apprised of marketing conditions and assist them in negotiating for improved, more uniform contracts and for improved prices.

The tri-state committee, at its initial meeting last month in Boise, recommended to the AAMA that there be an increase of 5 per cent in 1968 contract prices for processing potatoes, with an additional 10 per cent increase in Washington and other areas where contract prices are not currently equal to prices offered in other major areas; that payments be made by processors on small-sized potatoes, as in some cases small potatoes are now being utilized without compensation to growers; and that storage payments be made by processors to growers more truly reflect the cost of storage.

The AAMA is engaged in 46 marketing programs involving 32 commodities in 32 states.
