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WATCH YOUR MONEY!

Have you been wondering why your dollar doesn't seem to go as far as it did a few years ago?
Even though we are aware of the effect of inflation on the price of everything we buy, how many of us realize what the total cost of government is today and how this huge figure affects our lives.

Federal, state and local government spending has reached an estimated \$250 billion annually, not counting the billions going for defense. But it's difficult for Mr. and Mrs. Public to conceive of the total dollars they put in these three different government pockets. Uncle Sam's pocket accounts for 33 per cent of public spending, the states account for 24 per cent, and local governmental units 43 per cent - on the average.

However, regardless of what level of government spends the money, the fact remains that it comes first out of your pocket.

More control of government programs and spending is assured when services are handled and financed at state-local levels. Then Mr. and Mrs. Public have a better chance to say something about the relative priority of specific projects. They can keep a better check on spending when it's closer to home. One way to reduce the total drain is to make each dollar work harder - preventing duplication and waste in programs and personnel - and this can best be done right here where taxpayers can take a good look at what's happening. - Industrial Press Service

LOISE T. BOREN

Funeral rites for Loise Thomas Boren will be held at 10 a. m. (PST), 11 a. m. (MST) Saturday, April 6, 1968 at Langrell's mortuary in Baker.

Mr. Boren succumbed Tuesday morning after undergoing surgery at a hospital in Baker. He was born Oct. 9, 1911 at Estancia, N. M., a son of Thomas and Elizabeth Jenkins Boren. He attended schools in New Mexico and Colorado.

He was married May 15, 1937 to Theda E. Blackburn at Mancos, Colo. They moved to Jamieson in 1938 and to Durkee a year later. Mr. Boren worked on the Robert Shook ranch until 1949 when he began working as a section hand for the Union Pacific Railroad company. He was still with the railroad company at time of his death. From 1954 until 1959 the deceased commuted from Durkee to Adrian where Mrs. Boren operated a cafe.

Mr. Boren was a member of the first ward LDS church in Baker.

In addition to his widow of the home, he is survived by two sons, Leonard of Durkee and Tom of Corona, Calif.; two daughters, Mrs. Charles (Beth) Glenn and Mrs. Richard (Carly) Bennett of near Adrian.

Also surviving are nine grandchildren; three brothers, John of Durkee, Clarence and Earnest Boren of Cortez, Colo.; three sisters, Gladys Rathjen of Durango, Colo., Edith Salmon of Cortez, Colo., and Christine Katzdorn of Orange, Calif.

Graveside services will be conducted at 3 o'clock (MST) Saturday afternoon at the Owyhee cemetery southwest of Nyssa. Serving as pallbearers will be Charles Morrow, Sam Cordell, Ivan Thompson, Mac Overstreet, Ves Schmidling and Zeneth Cutting.
