Funeral services for Mrs. Frank (Bessie Louise) Bicandi were conducted Wednesday morning, April 10, 1968 at Lienkaemper chapel, with the Rev. Arthur Skogan officiating.

Mrs. Bicandi succumbed Sunday at Caldwell Memorial hospital, following an illness of two years.

She was born May 30, 1906 at Adrian, Mo., a daughter of Reed and Anna Deffenbaugh Eachus. She attended schools there and while a young adult moved to Springfield, Mo., and had been a resident of the Adrian, Ore., area for the past 31 years.

The deceased was married Nov. 5, 1938 to Frank Bicandi at Caldwell. The couple had owned and operated Bicandi's Cafe and Lounge in Adrian since that time.

Mrs. Bicandi was a member of the Baptist church, was active in community affairs and her favorite hobby was gardening.

In addition to Mr. Bicandi of the home, she is survived by one son, Floyd W. Gossard of Caldwell; two daughters, Mrs. Frances L. Freel and Mrs. Audrey L. Franklin, both of Adrian.

Also surviving are five brothers, Otto Eachus of Adrian, Mo., Roy Eachus of Wichita, Kans., Louis Eachus of Portland, Ore., Carl Eachus of Molalla, Ore., and Dean Eachus of Caldwell.

Thirteen grandchildren also survive. Mrs. Bicandi was preceded in death by a son, Robert Eugene Gossard in 1931 and a brother, Everett Eachus in 1965.

Interment was made in the Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper chapel. Serving as pallbearers were Ted Morinaka, Vern Parker, George Cartwright, Don Hatch, Bob Webster and Francis Thiel.

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500 CWT. POTATOES PER ACRE!
Here's how it was done... in this area



- Location**—Near Ontario, Oregon.
- Soil**—Sandy loam. Average fertility by soil tests.
- Fertilizer**—Preplant: 500 lbs. 21-0-0 and 10 lbs actual zinc. Broadcast and plowed down in spring. At planting: 100 lbs N, 200 lbs P₂O₅, 50 lbs K₂O. Band placed 2 in. below and 2 in. to side.
- Soil Insecticides**—Disyton, 3 lbs actual per acre.
- Parathion**, 2 lbs actual per acre. Both applied with fertilizer in the band.
- Seeding**—Early April. 36-in. rows. Seeds placed 5 in. deep, 9 in. spacing.
- Cultivation**—Mechanical.
- Irrigation**—Every 5 days during growing season. Total of 22 in. irrigation water.
- Yield**—500 cwt. per acre.
