A QUIET AFTERNOON WITH BALLOT SLOGANS

Ballot slogans can make ineresting reading -- especially

between the lines. Those little "quotations" folowing candidates' names on the ballot very seldom encapsule their complete political philosophies. But they can be indicative of issues and trends and, overlooking the inevitable cliches, of what the candidates believe to be the voters' biggest concerns.

Generally, ballot slogans are of two types. One reflects the record, abilities or qualifications of the candidate himself, while the second type attempts to define issues. The latter, of course, is of more speculative interest.

Thus it is interesting to note, with filings for public office in Oregon now completed, that more than a dozen state-level candidates of both parties call in their slogans for property tax relief.
