Charolais Group Accepts Nyssan For Membership

Nadene M. Garner of Nyssa, Oregon, has been accepted for membership in the American-International Charolais Assn., Houston, the nation's fourth largest and fastest-growing beef breed, announces J. Scott Henderson, executive secretary.

Originating in France more than 200 years ago, Charolais has become well established in this country because of the breed's greater weight-for-age, greater feeding efficiency and improved carcass values that produce a greater ratio of quality lean meat to fat than other breeds.

Registration of purebred Charolais during the past year totalled 17,618 animals, a 46% increase above year earlier figures. Transfers rose 41% as more and more new breeders enter the production picture.

Membership increased to 5,676 members, a 34% increase over new members the previous year.

There are now approximately 59,900 purebred and 183,183 recorded animals in the association's herd book and appendix, for a national herd of 243,098 animals.

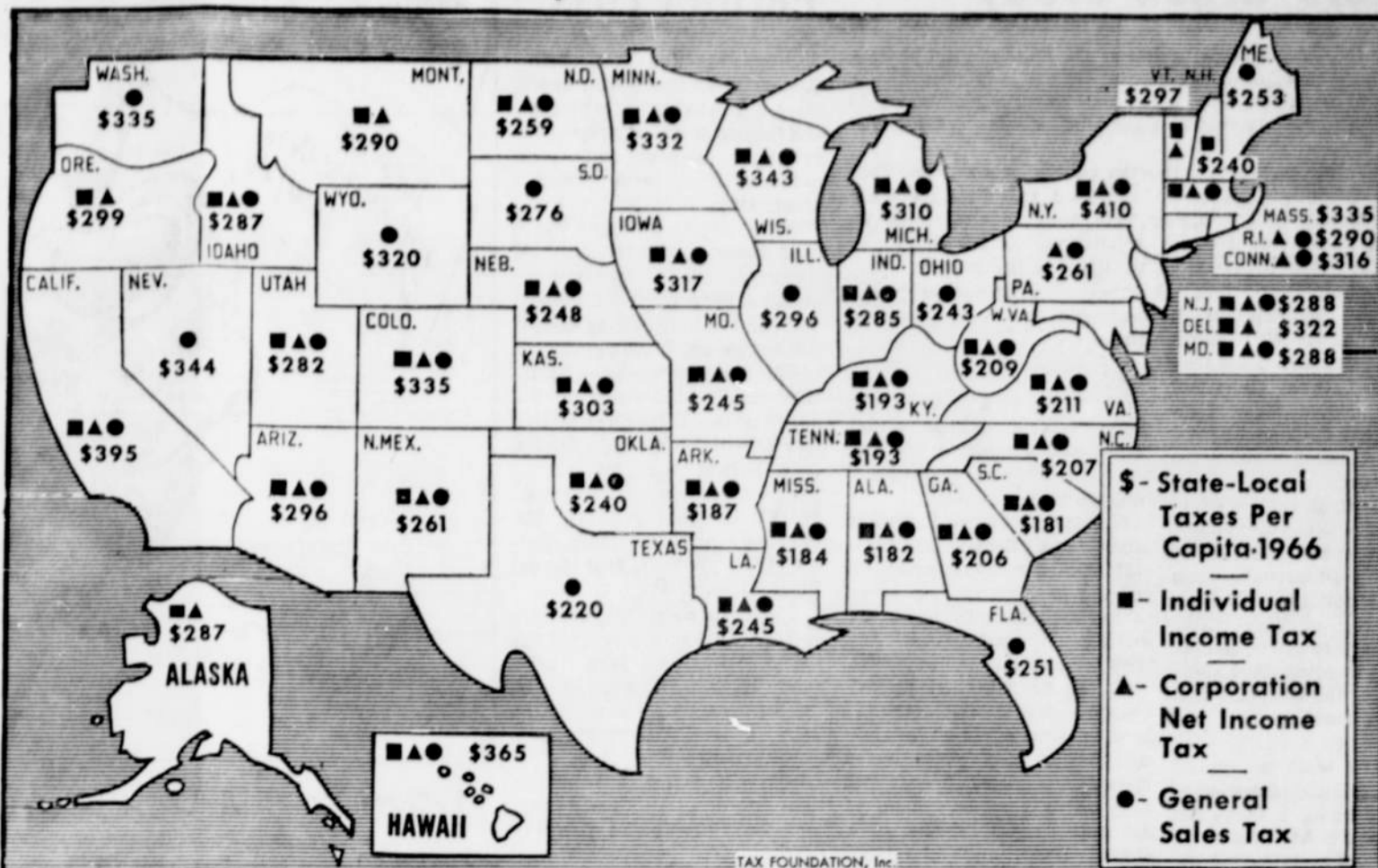

The map shows that 50 states levy at least one of these three taxes: general sales, individual income and corporate income. Thirty-three states have all three; seven, two each; and ten, one. (New Hampshire, New Jersey and Tennessee, however, tax only limited kinds of personal

income.) The figures in each state show 1966 state-local per capita taxes of which property taxes, mainly local, provide over two-fifths of the total.

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JP COURT CHANGE PLANS ABANDONED

Rudolf Hradecky, on behalf of the Citizens' Committee for Judicial Reform, announced Friday that the committee will circulate only one petition in the future. This petition will call for the creation of a district court in Malheur county.

An initial survey on consolidation of Justice of the Peace courts has indicated that people are opposed to any change in their JP courts.

Primary purpose of the committee has only been to urge the creation of a district court, and to ensure that adequate local forums be available. At the same time, the Committee feels that the citizens should be offered an opportunity to express their views on other aspects of the judicial system.
